
An Open Letter from Owner

one of the most special times of my entire life. My two wonderful daughters Beth Miller and Dawn Flexer who organized the event outdid themselves, down to every little detail.



> Newberry Sub Shop **Owner Sherry** (bottom left) with her three children: Beth (left), Dawn (center) and Dan (right).



REMEMBERING THE CORNER STORE

Early Newberry Businesses

These simple buildings were commercial venues, family residences and neighborhood gathering places where you could find meats, produce, baked goods, dry goods and any odds and ends you might need.

Each neighborhood had its own corner store, sometimes street by street. There were many ethnic groups living in Newberry; there was a smattering of Irish, German and others but the two major ethnic groups were Italian and Polish; the Reading Railroad tracks served as their neighborhood boundary. The ethnicity of the owners followed this division. The Federovich family owned two stores; one at the base of Arch Street and another on Reach Road. There was Krokowskis on Mosser Avenue, Domininski's, Candelori's (Lori's) on Funston and


Federal Avenue, Pelagrinos, Pauls Corner Store, Ulmers Grocery, Edwards, Crammers, Mo Day's and many more.

A few meat markets that come to mind were Lundys, Snyders, Reading, Hunter's and Seventh Ward Public Meat Market. The owners of these stores were your neighbors; you could run a tab, barter produce, eggs and services. Lenny Schlee tells of going down to the tracks and gathering coal that had fallen off the rail cars for his family to use and to trade. Another Newberry source tells of back rooms and cellars where poker, betting and the occasional nip of the brew occurred.

Several Lycoming Genealogical Society

members have been working to document Newberry corner stores and businesses. "Total count so far in the Newberry area is over 30 neighborhood stores and we're still counting," said Cindy Frey. With the advent of the modern super markets the corner stores slowly faded away."




Illustration of the interior of one of Newberry's early corner stores.



2010 PRIMARY ELECTION

Tuesday, May 18, 2010 Election Day

Polls are open on Election Day from 7:00 AM until 8:00 PM. Please remember Pennsylvania has what is called a Closed Primary, which only allows Republicans and Democrats to vote for candidates. If there is a referendum on the ballot, all registered voters may vote for the referendum regardless of party affiliation. Federal, State and party offices are on the ballot this year.

Pennsylvania law provides that the deadline to apply to **register to vote** is 30 days prior to each election. **Monday**, **April 19**, **2010 at 5:00 PM is the last day to register or make changes to your registration before the Primary Election**.

The deadline to apply for a civilian absentee ballot application is 7 days prior to each election. **Tuesday, May 11 at 5:00 PM is the last day to apply for a civilian absentee ballot before the Primary Election**.

If you will be out of your municipality during the hours the polling places are open on Election Day, or if you have an illness or physical disability that prohibits you from going to your polling place, then you may vote by absentee. If you need a voter registration application or an absentee ballot application you can:

The Newberry Lioness Club recently held their charter night to honor members and celebrate 25 years of serving the community. Lioness President



NEWBERRY'S WALKWAY/BIKEWAY

Editor's Note: With the upcoming grand opening of the Susquehanna River Walk and Timber Trail in the community's awareness, insideNewberry thought our readers would like to know what is envisioned to bring safe walkways/bikeways to Newberry.

For almost two years, members of the Newberry Community Partnership, in cooperation with the Elm Street Project have been exploring the possibility of a walkway/bikeway providing a

tangible and symbolic connection between historic Newberry and the younger village of Williamsport. The discovery of an abandoned railroad right of way paralleling Third Street from Arch to the existing bikeway on Lycoming Creek helped the effort morph from exploration to advocacy. Members of the NCP's Safe Clean & Green Committee met with Mayor Campana and Mr. Grado and received tentative approval for the plan. Lycoming County Transportation planner Mark Murawski also met with the Committee and indicated that this kind of project would be a welcome link in the over all County plan and in the Susquehanna Greenway project, a corridor of natural, cultural and recreational resources taking shape in Central PA. Mr. Murawski further suggested that the County might be able to help in the planning process.

The route would provide safe access to the bike path from a location in the heart of Newberry, as well as enabling residents access to the dike and exceptional views of the creek as the walkway crosses the Historic Iron Bridge before joining the existing bike path. As development of this concept progresses the Committee is recommending that a landscaped parking area be established near the intersection of Third Street and the Creek, on the west side. This convenient





location would provide access to the bike path and also offer parking for those who would walk, or perhaps ride, south along the creek into Susquehanna State Park.

In times of tight budgets and fiscal uncertainties, a project like this, estimated at roughly \$55,000.00 (excluding parking lot costs) is a challenge. The Committee believes that the first step would be to achieve a collaboration between the City, the County, private land owners and the NCP/Elm Street Project. Once the project is initiated, this joint effort could bring other interested stake holders on board to support the effort. Its realization would, the Committee believes, contribute significantly to making the greater Williamsport Community more pedestrian friendly and to a greener, healthier, more recreationally-oriented environment for Williamsport's West End and Newberry.

Lycoming Nursery School Plenty of Learning at LNS

Preschool students at Lycoming Nursery School are learning more than their ABC's. They are learning



healthy habits to last a lifetime. Children are taught basic hygiene skills, such as covering a sneeze and hand washing, as well as topics such as preparing healthy snacks. One class even grows bacteria samples so the children can see what germs look like.

Saint John's School of The Arts SOTA to Feature Student Performances




