

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GROWING UP IN NEWBERRY

When I tell people I grew up in the Catholic Church, I mean that literally. My father "Fred", "Freddie", "Saint Fred", "Pop", "Popi", or for us, the "Old Man"... was the custodian at Church of the Ascension from the mid sixties until his death in 1988.

What that meant for me and my brothers was we were his co-janitors. During the 70's the church's Social Hall was very active. **Besides** church activities. the hall

parties. If a function ran late on a Saturday night, we would get stuck cleaning until 1:00 or 2:00 AM so that it was ready for Sunday school the following morning.

And any time it snowed, Pop would have us cleaning up all night, if that's what it took to keep things clean before 8:30 AM Mass. He'd usually throw in some guilt trip about how badly we'd feel if an elderly person slipped and fell on a small spot we missed.

In the summer months we were busy stripping and waxing floors, washing windows, pulling weeds and cutting grass. Every morning Pop would leave the house early. He would make his rounds starting at the Newberry Post Office where he would pick up the church's morning mail and any local gossip going around. Then he would stop for coffee and go hang out with his friends, Angelo Incitti and Frank Carnevale at the New Ideal Barber Shop on the corner of West 4th and Poplar Streets. Pop was also known for his ability to barter. Every so often we would strip and wax the barber shop floor in trade for free haircuts. Sometimes he got to shooting the breeze and his rounds would take a couple of hours. But usually he'd be back by 9:00 and we would help until lunch and then disappear before he would find something else for us to do or volunteer us out to one of the neighbors.

When it was hot we would start the afternoon by swimming. We preferred the "crick" over Memorial Pool. Some days we would get together with other kids and build a dam to deepen our swimming hole, just north of the Fourth Street Bridge. Other times we'd float down to the Reading Railroad Bridge on inner tubes and jump off a few times before heading home. When the beltway was being built, we'd float our inner tubes on down to the coffer dam that was constructed to build the bridges. There we would ride our tubes thru the pipes under the dam; this was like a ride at an amusement park, only much more dangerous. Once you got near the pipe, it would suck you in and spit you out the other side...like you were shot out of a cannon. On one occasion, a guy who was with us chickened out at the last minute and he (Continued on Page 5)

grabbed the edge of the pipe. The force of the water ripped the tube out from under him and his body looked like a rag flapping in the breeze. After a minute or so he let go and came out the other side, shaken but unharmed.

It was unthinkable for us to be late for supper. Fortunately for us, my mother, sisters and grandmother, who lived with us, were all good cooks. Grandma Annuccia was born in Anara, Italy. She made a lot of great traditional Italian dishes but would also try to get us to eat things like tripe (cow's stomach), buccala (dried cod) and other things that to this day we don't know what they were.

After supper, we'd head up to Old Jackson to play basketball and hang out; or take our mini bikes up to the Dopey Desert, the area where Wahoo Drive is today.

Usually when Pop would see us taking off somewhere he'd grill us as to exactly where we were going and give us a warning like...*"Remember, if*

you get into trouble with the cops don't waste your only call on me." We knew he was joking, but we also knew that the punishment at home might be worse.

We would often joke that he had spies everywhere because he knew almost everybody in Newberry. They all seemed to know him too. During the sixties we had an old pickup truck. We'd haul things to the dump for the neighbors and we loved it when Pop would say... *"Don't pay me, pay my boys."* Having a couple of bucks in those days meant a lot.

He often encouraged us to make money on our own and would set us up for odd jobs around the neighborhood. One year when we just had a large



snowfall, with another storm forecast, people became frantic about cleaning the snow off roofs. Somehow, Tetley Tea officials got a hold of Dad and we were

hired. We were only there a short time before the roof started to crack and make strange noises. They made us get off in a hurry. When I was in ninth grade at Roosevelt, I needed to find a project for printing class. Once again, Pop hooked me up. A friend of his, Paul Burkhart, was in the catering business and in need of tickets and posters. Not only did I get a good grade, but I got paid as well. That was when I decided to go into the printing business that my wife Camille and I still operate today, known as MAS Printing. I consider growing up in

I consider growing up i "Newberry" in the 60's and

70's a great privilege and a lot of fun. No matter what direction you left the house or what the time of year, you could find some adventure to involve yourself in. In those days it seemed like summer lasted forever and the problems of the world seemed rarely to ever hit close to home.

I also consider myself extremely lucky to have had great parents and grandparents who fed and clothed us so well that we didn't realize we were poor. And also fortunate for good priests, mostly good teachers and neighbors, like Ron Perry, who kept us from getting into trouble too deeply. Although many of the old timers have passed away or moved away, my own personal success was possible because of the strong bonds we forged as kids. Those same kids are the business owners, city and county employees and average citizens we do business with today!

ROOSEVELT SCHOOL

Keeping It In The Family

Many people know the visage of Carol Mundrick at Roosevelt Middle School (RMS) because she's been the school's secretary since 1982!

What most people do not know is that she was a Roosevelt student from 1960 to 1963.

Carol Bertin as a Roosevelt Junior High School student, and now as Roosevelt Middle School's secretary.

Wow! A lot has changed in almost five decades. In 1961, when Carol Bertin entered the doors as a seventh grader, the school was known as Roosevelt Junior High School (RJHS) serving grades seven to nine and she was one of 900 students.

The dress code of that era was also different, girls wore dresses or skirts -NO pants, NO exceptions! Carol didn't enjoy wearing the required one-piece green gym suits, either.

The school interior is now very different, after undergoing renovation in 1999. The library and cafeteria were radically changed and many updates were made to the music, science and technology areas as well. What has not changed, besides the exterior of the building, is the goal of the school; to prepare students academically and socially for their roles as citizens of the Williamsport area. In that endeavor, two of the key players are Carol Mundrick and her mother Mildred Bertin.

Carol was born in Williamsport, the daughter of Mildred and Joseph Bertin. She grew up on Mahaffey Street with her parents and brothers Fred (now known as Joe), John (deceased) and Bob. As a junior high student, Carol was active in school life. She was a member of the gym club (with those awful green gym suits). As a ninth grader, she participated in the production of HMS Pinafore, an event that remains unforgettably pleasant to Carol to this day.

As a young adult, Carol lived in Mississippi, New Jersey, and New York State. She married and became a mother of two daughters, Missy and Robyn. In the 1980's Carol and daughters returned to her Williamsport roots. Her daughters Missy and Robyn also attended Roosevelt, by then known as a middle school.

Her mother Mildred was also a well-known presence in Newberry. For many years, she was employed in the



cafeteria at RJHS. As a parent of students in the Williamsport School District, Mildred was active as an officer in the PTA for many years and was the class parent for the graduating class of 1965-66.

Most neighbors probably knew Mildred through her longtime association with the Newberry Lioness



Club. She was a charter member, held many offices and was active in the community until poor health slowed her down. Sadly, Mildred died in the summer of 2008. Her passing was a great loss to Newberry.

Mahaffey Street home, right across the street from Roosevelt Middle School. However, that is not the only place you will find Carol; you might see her smiling face at Dunkin' Donuts, where she has worked for 19 years, or at WASD athletic events, where she has been a ticket seller for games in the district for 25 years.

When asked about Newberry, Carol says, "I love Newberry. I am very comfortable here. I appreciate the neighborly atmosphere that permeates the area, where everyone sticks together. I wouldn't want to live anywhere else."

HOW *DO* CANDIDATES GET ON THE BALLOT?

The local primaries always draw numerous candidates who vie for the opportunity to represent their respective parties in the November general election.

In case you're wondering....how DO they get on the ballot? We asked Sandy Adams of Voter Services to share the procedures with us.

There are two methods by which a candidate may place their name on the November ballot. One is to file nomination petitions for their party's nomination in the primary. The second is to file nomination papers for minor political parties or political bodies. Each candidate must:

- File the appropriate petition
- Get a required number of signatures depending on the office for which they are running
- File a candidate's affidavit which includes information about the candidate
- File a Statement of Financial Interests form, which requires the filer to set forth information regarding the filer's sources of income

KNOW BEFORE YOU VOTE

IDENTIFICATION

If you are a newly registered voter or voting in an election district for the first time, you must show an approved form of photo or non-photo ID.

VOTING INSTRUCTIONS

EMERGENCY BALLOTS

Emergency ballots can be issued under some circumstances (of course, you must still be registered):

- 1.) If you are 65 years of age or older and disabled you may be eligible to vote by Alternative ballot if you are assigned to an inaccessible polling place.
- 2.) If an emergency arises after the deadline for absentee ballots, you have until 8:00 PM on Election Day to apply for an Emergency Ballot at the county Board of Elections. If illness is the reason, the application will need a physician's signature. If absence from the municipality is the reason the application will need to be notarized.

Sample ballots will be available in the Voter Services Office located in the Executive Plaza, 330 Pine Street, 1st Floor, Williamsport starting Monday, May 4, 2009. Office hours are 8:30 AM to 5:00 PM. Phone 327-2267.

ABSENTEE BALLOTS

If you would like an absentee ballot, you'll need to know that:

- 1.) March 30th is the first day to apply for an absentee ballot.
- 2.) May 12th is the deadline for absentee ballots.
