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

at the Center. This program is for those with very limited income and offers on the job training for its participants while providing community service at a non-profit host


agency. Learning to develop a job search plan and developing a strong support plan are all goals of the Experience Works Job Club. One not only learns

ORIGINS OF NEWBERRY MONUMENT

History of "The Light of Liberty"

In recent months *insideNewberry* received calls about the origins of the beautiful monument "The Light of Liberty" that graces the intersection of Arch and West 4th Streets and the cover of *insideNewberry*. Who does the memorial honor? Who was the artist?

What follows is a brief response about the monument and a thumbnail sketch about the artist. We'll cover the full story in April 2012.

May of 2012, Lady Liberty will be 90 years old. The Newberry Community Partnership and **insideNewberry** thinks it would be a great idea to throw a birthday party for her. Please let us know.. Do you like that idea? Are you related to any of the men and women who are memorialized or were instrumental in erecting the monument? Do you have pictures of them or the celebration parade & dedication?

THE MONUMENT

The idea for the memorial was conceived by a group of Newberry women. They held their first gathering at the home of Gertrude Herman in June of 1920, to lay plans to erect a memorial to the men and women who made the ultimate sacrifice in World War 1. The names of those honored were the soldiers, sailors and Red Cross Nurses of the 7th & 11th Wards and adjoining townships.

The project took 2 years from inception to completion. We've estimated that over 70 men and women worked diligently and tirelessly for countless hours over that period to form an organization, fundraise, research and select the monument company, compose and publish a history of their efforts and plan a proper dedication celebration. To them we owe our gratitude for a gift of beauty that continues to be a source of pride and honor to our community.

THE ARTIST

Do we realize how fortunate we are to have a unique work of art by a renowned sculptor in our community? Giuseppe Moretti (February 1857 – February 1935) was born in Siena, Italy, the nephew of Vincenzo Cardinal Moretti, a noted art patron. He began studying marble sculpting at the age of 9 with the monks of San Domenico and with sculptor Tito Serrochi. He moved to Carrara to perfect his skills. At age 22, he moved to Zagreb, Croatia and made several important commissions before a large earthquake devastated the area.

Moretti relocated to Vienna, Austria where he worked on the Rothschild Palace and executed a marble bust of Emperor Franz Josef for the 1900 Paris Exposition. He then moved to Budapest, Hungary where he undertook works to commemorate the city's history. In the summer of 1888, he emigrated to the



United States and opened a studio in New York City. His first commission was a sculpture of the "Marble House" of William K. Vanderbilt in Newport, RI. After working on the Vanderbilt estate, Moretti became well-known in Pittsburgh, maintaining a presence there from 1895 until 1923.

His reputation as an artist soon won his most famous commission from James A. MacKnight, secretary of Birmingham, Alabama's Commercial Club. Moretti agreed to charge only \$6,000 for the massive plaster model of Vulcan, the largest cast iron sculpture in the world for Birmingham's contribution to the St. Louis Exposition.

Moretti moved around east of the Mississippi frequently after 1916, returning to Pittsburgh, where he established a permanent residence and studio on Bigelow Boulevard.

A prolific artist, Moretti made war memorials a major source of income completing 12 World War I memorials, 19 monumental works, 6 church sculptures, 24 memorial

tablets, 14 memorials, 27 sculptures in marble, bronze, and aluminum and 27 bronze statues.

In Pittsburgh, you will find many of Moretti's notable works of art – in bronze, marble and granite.

In 1930, in failing health, he and his wife Dorothea Long Moretti returned to San Remo, Italy where he remained until his death in 1935.

A big thank you to Phil Preziosi for briefly parting with his copy of the original program booklet containing the short history of the Newberry Memorial Association to scan the original photo and for researching the life of artist Giuseppe Moretti.

NEW FIRE TRUCK FOR WILLIAMSPORT FIRE DEPARTMENT

New Aerial Fire Fighting Truck for Williamsport's Firefighters

Deputy Chief Dave Dymeck stopped in to chat about the new Pierce Arrow XT Aerial Fire Fighting Truck the Williamsport Fire Department recently purchased with Community Development Block Grant funds. The new truck, dubbed Tower One (T1 for short), replaces the original, 1999 Tower One. The new T1 has a tower that extends 100 feet high. That's almost as high as the top floor of the Genetti Hotel.


By tradition, Williamsport Fire Trucks have been red and white, but T1 is glossy red, simply because it costs more for 2 colors. So, this T1 will set a new tradition in color, and safety too. Reaching the scene quickly is important but this truck has an automatic rollover protection system that slows the vehicle down if a corner is taken too fast. It also automatically deploys the supports that keep the vehicle secure when the tower is extended, reducing set up time and allowing fire fighters to get to work a little faster. The 100' platform is controlled from the platform itself and from the ground. The ground controller often has a better perspective and can stop the platform from striking obstructions, such as wires, that can't be seen from above.

Every firefighter's duty is to protect life and property, so it makes sense they would want to protect the planet by using Green apparatus. T1 can't claim to be 100% Green, but it does have a system that reduces emissions and is more environmentally friendly than old T1.

This is the largest vehicle Williamsport's Fire Department has and it responds to all "Box Alarms", that means structure alarms and vehicle entrapment events, so we can, unfortunately, expect to see T1 often. But T1 also makes pleasant house calls! T1 and its drivers will be at the Newberry Community Festival in Newberry Park on Saturday, April 30th.

Voter Information & Registration

- Pennsylvania is a Closed Primary only registered Democrats and Republicans can vote.
- All registered voters may vote for a referendum regardless of party affiliation, however at the time of this printing there are no referendums on the ballot.
- State, County, City, School Directors, Township, and Borough offices are on the ballots this year.

Deadline to register to vote or make changes to your registration is Monday, April 18, 2011 at 5:00 PM, 30 days prior to the election.

Civilian Absentee Ballot deadline is Tuesday, May 10, 2011 at 5:00 PM -7 days prior to Primary.

If you have an illness and or physical disability that prohibit you from voting, or will be out of your municipality during the hours the polling places are open, you may vote by absentee for the Primary Election.






Together We Teach the Child

Spring is here! For Jackson students and faculty that means preparation for the final weeks of the school year. At Jackson, we pride ourselves in working closely with our



student's families. In doing so, we recognize

that the education of the child is not depending solely on us. We rely a great deal on family members to continue to support their child's learning especially during summer vacation. In this article, I wish to share the many ways family members can ensure their child continues to progress and retain what they worked so diligently to learn over the school year.



- **Inspire a lifelong love of learning** visit museums, libraries, points of interest.
- Encourage your child to ask questions about how things work and why things happen. A curious child is the best learner.
- Talk often help build language and word knowledge.
- Help build self-esteem effort is important not just success or failure.
- **Stimulate creativity** sing, play an instrument, paint, draw, cook with them.
- Show a love for reading let them see you read. Read to them often. Ask them to read to you. Keep your attitude for reading positive. Becoming a better reader is hard work and needs practice.
- Limit TV viewing too much can hurt reading skills and attention span.

Helping young children develop language skills is crucial to success in school. They have to learn to say things they want to say. Talking allows them to organize their thoughts, put their ideas into words and helps them explore ideas with others. Reading to your child is equally important. They need to hear the "tune" of written language as they become familiar with books and stories. The sound of written language differs from what is heard in their environment. They learn to read better when they are familiar with written language. Read stories over and over again until they get to know if you left out a part or changed the words.

Be sure that your child reads every day. Keep a log of books read and/or the amount of time spent reading. Local libraries and the Williamsport Area School District both support the use of reading logs.

The summer will "get away from you" before you know it. Students often experience the "summer slide" if not reading regularly and may drop back a year or more in their reading level.

Encourage older children to visit the website at Jackson. Many teachers have designed their websites to include links to on-line learning activities. Visit <u>www.wasd.org</u> and click on Jackson School. Go to a teacher at your child's grade level to visit sites.

As we enter the final portion of the school year, the Jackson faculty wishes to thank our community for all the support we received in educating your child. We want the same things for your child- positive feelings about school and continued academic growth.



Home Pre-Purchase Workshops

Counseling Department at STEP, Inc. is offering **FREE** workshops to anyone interested in the basics of home ownership. Each class consists of 2 sessions of 2 hours each and covers the following topics:



- Role of the Real Estate Agent Sales Contract
- Financing & Closing Costs
- Real Estate Taxes
- Credit & Budgeting
- Closing Documents
- Fair Housing Law

Classes are held once a month during the day or evening depending on the demand and are held in the Head Start or Youth Build buildings on Boyd Street behind the main STEP building.

Renovate & Repair Loans Are Now Available at STEP

These loans are a great source of funding for homeowners who need as little as \$2,500 or as much as \$35,000 to complete repairs and/or renovations. The loans are funded by the Pennsylvania Housing Finance Agency (PHFA) who participates with STEP to offer these loans to homeowners in Lycoming and Clinton Counties.

The proceeds can only be used to complete repairs or renovations that improve basic livability and/or affect health, safety, energy efficiency, accessibility, and code violations. There is a sliding scale of fixed interest rates, beginning at 6.375%. There is no application fee and closing cost assistance is available for those who meet income guidelines.




No equity is required and the credit guidelines are flexible. Terms of 10, 15 or 20 years are available and the closings are held locally at the STEP office on Lincoln Street in Williamsport. The loan is secured by real estate and does involve a mortgage.

As part of the loan process, STEP provides guidance in locating contractors and preparing bids. STEP also oversees construction and arranges inspections of completed work.

Eligibility can be determined by telephone, but appointments are necessary to apply. To schedule an appointment, call the Housing Counseling Office at 570-601-9674 or email <u>mafleming@stepcorp.org</u>.

STEP is a PHFA certified counseling agency and also administers the EHLP and HEMAP loan programs which help homeowners in danger of losing their homes through foreclosure. STEP also offers free credit and debt counseling as well as pre-purchase and pre-closing counseling. For additional information about any of our programs you can call the above number. The office is open Monday through Friday from 8:30 AM to 4:30 PM.



TOUR DE BILL 4: DISCOVER WILLIAMSPORT BY BICYCLE

Ride benefits YMCA Strong Kids Campaign

The YMCA is again sponsoring the Tour de Bill, an event when people can get out and enjoy Williamsport by bicycle. The 15-mile route provides riders an opportunity to explore the many facets of the City of Williamsport plus enjoy the Susquehanna River on the bike path. Beginning and ending at the YMCA downtown on Elmira Street, riders will go from Newberry to the East End,



through historic, industrial, college, hospital, center city, and residential neighborhoods. "The Tour de Bill is not intended as a race but as a casual ride and the number of riders is increasing each year," said Louisa Stone, founder of this popular event.

Other than the section on the bike path, the route is on city streets where riders will share the road with cars. Cyclists are responsible for their own safety and must sign a liability waiver. Riders must obey traffic rules and wear helmets. Parents should be sure that their children are capable of riding on city streets with traffic.

Two rest stops where riders can enjoy water, snacks, and restroom facilities will be designated. Riders can also



stop at other places such as Newberry Park, the Public Art Academy and Eagle Rock Winery at the Pajama Factory on Rose Street.

A detailed map of the route will be provided. Group leaders are available beginning at 8:00 AM. The ride will go rain or shine with perhaps a delay if it is raining. The rest stops will close at 1:00 PM. Not counting stops, most riders can complete the ride in 2 - 3 hours.

Register online at www.williamsportymca.org, by mail, at the Y front desk, or at the Y Arena the morning of the ride. Posters and registration forms will be distributed at various locations around the area. For the entry fee (\$15 for adults, \$5 for people under eighteen), riders will receive an event t-shirt, route map, and snacks at rest stops.

The YMCA is the primary sponsor and will handle the administration, insurance certificate, and permits. The ride benefits the YMCA Strong Kids Campaign which provides Y scholarships to needy children.

- 1. Clean up and remove any rubbish/debris and garbage around the property.
- 2. Place all rubbish/debris and garbage inside approved containers. If you are a renter, then the landlord must provide you with a leak proof, covered, outside garbage container.
- 3. Clean out the gutters and downspouts and remove any debris that might have gotten trapped.
- 4. Make a list of projects that need to be done. If you are a renter, make a complete list of items that you have noticed and give it to your landlord with an explanation of the items:
 - a. Remove all chipping and peeling paint on exterior of house



- b. Repair roof
- c. New window screens

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
