## **REVIVAL OF INSIDE NEWBERRY DAY**

### Event Deemed a Big Success

When we invited one and all to come "celebrate life in Newberry" and "reunite with old friends" at Visit Inside Newberry Day this past October, we really didn't know what to expect.

We are happy to report that the combined efforts of the Newberry Community Partnership (NCP), the Lycoming County Genealogical Society (LCGS) and the Sun-Gazette made the revival a huge success. Well...that statement is only partially true. It was you, the residents and friends of Newberry, who turned out in numbers to honor our rich history and of 4 neighborhood spirit that truly made the day.

Initially, we urged everyone to bring their scrap books, photos and documents for the LCGS to scan for their archives. But five days before the event, Cindy Frey, LCGS Secretary, surprised the NCP with the news that they had prepared a huge exhibit entitled "Newberry: A village of immigrants" with photocopy displays of documents and images relevant to the early histories of Newberry/Jaysburg as well as early maps, immigration, burial and census documents. Packets containing a family tree chart, list of books, magnifying glass and Internet sites were prepared for the youngsters.

# **ELM STREET NEWS**

### **NCP** Applies for Grant

The NCP has applied for an Elm Street Residential Reinvestment Grant to fund streetscape improvements along West Fourth Street from Moore Avenue to Arch Street. The proposed project also includes a funding request for a façade improvement program for residential and commercial properties located in the Elm Street designated area. ### 3 Frequently Asked Questions about Elm Street

# *I didn't know there was an Elm Street in Newberry, where is it?*

There is no Elm Street in the city, however a portion of West 3rd Street was once known as Elm Street. Remember Elm Park Golf Course on West 3rd Street?

#### So, what's this Elm Street I keep hearing about?

Pennsylvania is the only state with the foresight to realize that stable neighborhoods must exist to support a vital downtown. In 2004, the Commonwealth initiated a neighborhood program to support the many Main Street initiatives throughout the state. The new program, modeled after the Main Street community-based approach developed by the National Trust for Historic Preservation, was named Elm Street.

# Why is my block not included in the Elm Street Program and who decided where the boundaries would be?

The entire Newberry neighborhood was designated in the NCP's original application for Elm Street designation. Early in 2007 members of state and local Departments of Economic & Community Development and PA Downtown Center visited Newberry. It was determined that Newberry was too large an area - that revitalization funds would be spread too thin to make a significant impact so the ES boundaries were redefined: East – Moore Avenue, North – West 4th Street, South - Trenton Avenue, West – Poplar Street. Arch Street's commercial corridor from 3rd Street to Hillside Avenue is also included.

### Common Ground



### Census Bureau Seeks Local Help

Every ten years the United States counts. Its people, that is. Mandated by the US Constitution Article 1, Section 2 requires a census be taken every decade. This has been done every 10 years since 1790. In that year federal marshals on horseback traveled the United States and determined there were 3.9 million people in the newly formed nation. Today it is over 305 million.

Over 50 employees of the US Census Bureau Scranton office will provide clerk, administrative assistant, and supervisor support in preparation for Census 2010. The remaining field positions will be distributed throughout the 15 county area that supports the Scranton office. The Census Bureau is offering full and part-time positions, featuring flexible hours, competitive wages, and an opportunity to work near home. All jobs are temporary. This massive effort will need thousands of individuals

who would like part-time work. The pay ranges from about \$11 - \$14 per hour. Most jobs have very flexible hours and can be done at night or on weekends.

"This is great part-time money for a few weeks of your time," says Charlie Spano, Assistant Manager for Recruiting, who has the responsibility of scheduling all testing in locations around northeast Pennsylvania and maintaining the pool of qualified applicants. Charlie has been to Williamsport several times and plans to staff an office here in the near future. The response has been strong in Williamsport but many more people are needed. The population and housing census effort employs some of the most sophisticated technical and operational knowledge and tools available, as well as a work force of 1.3 million temporary employees to count every man, woman and child once and in the right place. Census results are the basis for congressional representation as well as the distribution of federal, state and local funds totaling more than \$300 billion annually. **Census Day is April 1, 2010.**

### **Poor Economy Hits Home as Store Closes**

The unbeatable combination of household staples, unique items at affordable prices and a friendly staff made The Dollar Bazaar at the corner of West 4th and Diamond Street a magnet for neighborhood locals and savvy shoppers from miles around. Unfortunately, this was not enough to overcome the current economic reality that faced store owner Jason Slottje, who determined that December 5, 2008 would be the last day of business for the store.

Jason told *insideNewberry* that the economy, fuel prices, difficulty in finding the bargain items his customers came to expect and the 3 hour trip from his distribution center in Owego, NY made it very difficult to maintain profitability.

"I want to thank the great Newberry staff and the community for all your support over the past 11 years," said Jason.

"Many people, who depended on the store for a lot of food basics, cried when they heard the news," said Nancy Colley, Newberry resident and store Manager for six years. The tremendous bargains offered in the closing months were small consolation prizes for the loyal customers as they shopped and visited with the staff. "We are really going to miss seeing our customers", said Dottie Goehrig, Assistant Manager. Jeanie Baker, Linda Toti and Tony Ernest, staff members, echoed Dottie's sentiments. "We really got to know everyone – it felt like family."

On behalf of the community, we want to thank you for all the years of friendly service and filling so many household needs through the years. The store and the staff will be missed.

## THINKING OUTSIDE THE BOOKS

Today's libraries provide much more than just books. The Lycoming County Library System has added a new "library," the eBranch, an entirely online library branch that is available to any Lycoming County resident from any internet-connected computer. The eBranch website is divided into five sections: Get it NOW, Ask it NOW, LEARN it NOW, for KIDS NOW, and Look it UP NOW.

Get it NOW is your jumping off point for signing up for a library card, downloading audiobooks to listen to on your computer or MP3 player, downloading ebooks to read, and downloading music, videos, and news.

Ask it NOW lets you connect with a live tutor for help with student's homework seven days a week from 3 PM to 10 PM. We have Ferguson's Career Guidance Center here, which gives you information on over 3300 different jobs and tutorials on looking for, finding, getting, and holding the job you want.

LEARN it NOW provides the Home Improvement and Auto Repair Reference Centers, with instructions on how to do many projects in these fields. Learning Express Library provides tutorials and sample tests for many different things. Learn a Language has many different courses to help you learn another language.

For KIDS NOW has online animated audio story books for younger kids. There's a section for preschool kids too. For teens, there are many links to help improve their writing skills, to suggest interesting reading and to let them interact with other teens from around the world.

Look it UP NOW has everything else we couldn't fit under one of the first four categories. Select "Online Resources (Subjects)" to browse through all the different areas, from health to legal to business to education.

Now that I've whetted your appetite you need to know how to get to all the good stuff. The website for the eBranch is <u>http://www.lycolibrary.org</u>. You'll need to register for an eCard account, your own personal account for the use of all Lycoming County Library System online resources. To do so, just click on "Get an eCard" at the top of the home page. Once you fill out the simple form you'll be set to use all the resources we provide. I suggest you take some time to browse through the entire website; you're sure to find something that will intrigue you! ~ *By Doug Loss* 

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# **SECOND MURAL UNVEILED**

### Mural Creations Continue

For the second consecutive year, the Newberry Community Partnership (NCP) was awarded a \$600 grant to create a mural celebrating the life and history of our Newberry neighborhood. Collaborating with members of the Jackson School Art Club under the guidance of Sandra Corson, the second panel titled *Newberry: Honoring Our Past, Planning for Our Future* was unveiled Wednesday, December 19th at the school. Members of the Arts Council, NCP Board, Williamsport Area School District, Mayor Campana, along with friends and families of the artists were on hand for the occasion.

"The enthusiastic response to our first mural, *A Look at Our Corner of the City* encouraged us to seek the second grant," said board member Bill Kieser. The public unveiling of the new mural will take place at the 4th Annual Newberry Neighborhood Block Party, Friday, April 3rd (see calendar for details). The mural will be mounted on the West Fourth Street side of the former Dollar Bazaar next to the first mural.

The funds to create the mural are from a grant the Partnership obtained through the City of Williamsport Cultural Grant Program. The City of Williamsport Cultural Grant Program is an initiative between the City of Williamsport and the Pennsylvania Council of the Arts, a state agency and is administered by the Lycoming Arts Council.




A regular Wednesday feature is a visit from a member of the Newberry Ministerium, who leads a **Bible Study** at 12:30 PM.

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together. She offers computer training classes and individual sessions to the residents. Jackie is as NASCAR fan and is working on her second BS in IT Networking.







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# LYCOMING NURSERY SCHOOL

### Newberry School Going Strong for 40 Years

When it comes to filling a need for their children there's no stopping inspired, committed mothers. That's what happened forty years ago when a small group of mothers who wanted something more



formal than play groups for their pre-schoolers, got together and founded the Lycoming Nursery School (LNS). The name derived from the ideal facility they discovered at the Lycoming Presbyterian Church, located at 825 Arch Street in Newberry. It offered large sunny classrooms and a "Big Room" for physical play to keep the children safe and in sight. To get started, the families built most of the equipment such as paint easels, shelves, a sand box, water tables and much more.

The 3,4, and 5 year-olds learn and develop academic and social skills using art, music, Spanish, sign-language, reading and early mathematics, taught by skilled, certified teachers. They enjoy monthly field trips, the weekly Stretch-n-Grow Program, music classes and Storymobile visits.

I was so impressed with the program and the staff that when a position for an aide became available, I decided to apply for it!"

Shelly Treese commented "My children Blayden and Joseph adjusted very fast to LNS. They love to go to school. Every day when they come home they are so excited to show me what they did that day and what they learned. LNS is a wonderful start to schooling for my children in Newberry."

This "parent run" non-profit, non-sectarian pre-school holds fundraisers twice a year along with a March yard sale to help with the costs of field trips and the school's year- end trip on the Hiawatha. To help keep tuition costs down, parents provide a daily healthy snack.

The LNS school board consists of teachers, parents and committee members. New positions are filled by parents in the spring or as needed. Monthly board meetings are open to parents.
