# **BRODART GETS A MAKEOVER**

## **Company Reinvests in Building**

Many in our community are very familiar with the six-story headquarters building of Brodart Co., near the corner of West 3rd and Arch Street in Newberry. But did you know the structure, built in 1920, was originally occupied by the the Armour Leather Company, a tannery? Those who grew up in Newberry may recall hearing some of the building's rich history.

For instance, an historical note of interest is the reason why all the windows were painted black. In 1942, during World War II, the County Office of Civil Defense asked Americans to participate in "blackouts", which were intended to darken cities so enemies could not see and hit their targets in an air raid. The tannery complied, painting windows black, allowing the tannery to continue night shifts.

In the 1960's Brodart moved into the property and continues its

business as a provider of books, supplies and furniture for the library and educational institution markets.

Recently, Brodart reinvested in the building by replacing the old painted windows, the roof, the heating and air condition units, added a fresh coat of paint and made significant improvements to increase energy efficiency; Making this landmark a focal point that the company and community can be proud of.

Brodart continues to be a supporter of the community through time and donations to the YMCA, the Steven's Reads program, hosts the Newberry Community Partnership's annual Newberry/Jaysburg Christmas Tree lighting and Visit from Santa, and holds their popular bi-annual Book and DVD sale.

# NCP'S SAFE CLEAN & GREEN TEAM: DIRECTION FOR 2015

## Walkway – Bikeway

For several years we have been working in pursuit of a corridor running parallel to 3rd Street along the old RR bed from Arch to the ancient RR bridge over Lycoming Creek, connecting to the existing bike path. This would make an excellent portal into and out of Newberry and take pedestrians on foot and bike off rather dangerous West 3rd Street. The holdup has been an inability to connect with key property owners.

Recently David Stone, the new Bicycle Coordinator for Williamsport, addressed the NCP's Safe, Clean & Green Team. David is promoting a more bike friendly Williamsport for a multitude of very good reasons and states that this Newberry route, along with better access to the River Walk, are the two most important goals for him and his committee. Lycoming County transportation planner, Mark Murawski has met with S,C&G and supports the idea and can be enlisted to help promote the plan.

David believes that we need to show the Mayor and others, that there is real community interest in such a plan. At his suggestion, the NCP will be drafting a resolution that board members and S,C&G members would sign. We will seek the support of residents, community leaders and business people in Newberry to support this idea.

# **Community Policing**

We would like to see the return of community policing, (CP) in Newberry. When we had some form of this with Officer Mark Lindauer attending monthly meetings, we were learning about the potential of CP. We had a productive two way exchange of information that gave us a sense we were contributing to the safety of the community. Several years ago there was a change in organizational structure in the police department; CP was eliminated.

As a result of several letters to the Mayor and other safety officials, I was invited by Mayor Campana to meet with him and Chief Foresman and advocated for the return of CP. Lt. Helm, who was involved with CP in the past attended the October SCG meeting and we had a lively, informative give and take session. Although it doesn't look like CP will come any time soon, we will continue to pursue it.

# **Renovation of Deteriorated Housing**

This would be an intense and rather complex project and practically speaking, may need to follow the first two. Using programs that exist for this purpose, NCP would purchase deteriorated or condemned housing and oversee its renovation. The property could be sold to appropriate individuals or families, or kept and managed for an income stream. There are many details of this project but doing the necessary research and planning would be worthwhile. A program such as this would represent a huge step toward promoting a safe and attractive future for our community.

For the NCP to embrace these projects, we will need additional people with ideas, energy and skills to make it happen. We know you are out there folks. It's critical that you join with us to make them happen.


#### Winter Clothing Drive

performances are just some of the field trips that the students at WBS are frequently treated to. It is a tradition for the 3rd through 6th grade-age students to take an annual City Trip. Each year, parents and teachers work together to choose a large city within about 3-4 hours driving distance of Williamsport. City Trips in the past have included Baltimore, MD, and New York City. This year, Harrisburg was chosen.

The scholars started out the day with a guided tour of the Capitol Building. Upon entering the Capitol Building, they were instantly enchanted by the sight of the Capitol Rotunda fully decorated for the holidays. The tour proceeded through the Senate Chamber, where Pennsylvania's 50 state Senators meet and vote. The tour then moved to the House Chamber. In addition to learning the business that goes on the in the room, the group was interested to learn about the priceless artwork that adorns the walls, as well as the six crystal chandeliers used to light the House. (There are over 1,000 light bulbs!) Pennsylvania's Supreme Court Chamber was the final stop on the tour.

Following the tour of the Capitol Building was a much anticipated visit to the Whitaker Science Center. Upon arriving at the center, students were immediately immersed in the iMax film, Forces of Nature. They got to ride with the flow of lava as it erupted out of a volcano and got to see what it's like to be in a tornado! After the film, students were then able to explore the

many hands-on science exhibits on the three floors of the science center. "I liked the flood table where you could build a dam to help save the houses when a flood was coming. You had to figure out how to build it so no water would come in!" says 4th grade student Phaedra Bower. 

# SINGLE-STREAM RECYCLING ARRIVES

# **Recyling Just Got Easier.**

Recycling just got easier for a six-county region, as Lycoming County Resource Management Services (LCRMS) celebrated the grand opening of its \$5.3 million single-stream recycling facility and the subsequent launch of a new regional recycling program, "One For All."

According to Newberry native Jason Yorks, county recycling coordinator, the new single-stream process will allow residents and businesses to combine all their recyclable materials into a single bin, eliminating the need for separation or multiple bins, and also allow a wider range of recyclable materials to be picked up together. Additional materials may be accepted that were not before, including Nos. 1 through 7 plastics, and aseptic gable-top containers such as juice and soup cartons.

The 60,000-square-foot facility, located on Route 15 adjacent to the Lycoming County Landfill in Montgomery, utilizes the latest technology to collect, separate and bale up to 20 tons of comingled recyclables per hour.

"Single-stream shifts curbside pickup from the county to private business," Yorks said, "which we feel will be a much more efficient system. With this new facility and program in place, we'll now be able to preserve valuable landfill space, increase our capacity,

have a more cost-effective, convenient way to recycle, and hopefully, improve local recycling participation," Yorks said. "For residents, it's a more convenient way to recycle, and for haulers, it's an opportunity for business. We see it as a win-win."

Participating waste haulers will provide individual collection bins for homeowners, while Lycoming County's 27 recycling drop-off sites will also continue to operate. Those haulers will now pick up unsorted recyclable materials from residents' homes, and be paid by the county for recyclable materials.




Tupper and Barbara Fink.

# Ask the Lawyer

Answers are provided by Newberry resident, Christian Frey of Lepley, Engelman and Yaw. Attorney Frey has been practicing law in Pennsylvania since 2003.

- **Question:** I am interested in buying a house but the seller seems vague when answering the questions I ask about the home. How can I be sure that I know what I am buying?
- **Answer:** Buying a home is a huge financial undertaking. You must be sure that you know the condition of the house and can obtain clear title before you finalize your purchase. There are three very important aspects that your lawyer should help you with regarding your forthcoming purchase: (1) Agreement of Sale;
  - (2) Title Search; and
  - (3) obtaining a Seller's Disclosure.

Agreement of Sale: This is the document that sets forth the terms and conditions of the transaction. If you need a mortgage to buy the home, your lawyer will make sure that your sales agreement is properly conditioned upon financing and explain what the ramifications of breaking the contract would be.

Title Search: In addition to explaining what type of deed you'll be receiving, your lawyer will make sure that a title search is performed. Examination of a title will let you know if any liens or easements or other claims may affect the property that you want to buy.

Seller's Disclosure: The law requires sellers to disclose material defects with the property, of which they have actual knowledge. A material defect is a problem that has a significant adverse impact on the value of the property, or that involves unreasonable risk to people on the property. Your lawyer will ensure that the seller will complete a detailed disclosure form.

The "Answer" above is for general information only. Small variations in individual fact patterns often change the legal outcome or an attorney's conclusion. 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# STEP To Offer Tax Assistance to Seniors

STEP Inc. will again be offering tax assistance to senior citizens this tax season. The STEP Office of Aging annually partners with local volunteers, the AARP Foundation, and the IRS to offer free assistance with completing tax returns.

The AARP Tax-Aide program is designed to help low- to moderate-income taxpayers, and focuses on people age 60 and older. The program can help with tax provisions such as the taxable portion of retirement income, different standard deduction amounts, permissible health care deductions, treatment of capital gains, losses, dividends and interest, taxable treatment of social security benefits, and tax implications on death of a spouse.

Program volunteers are trained and IRS-certified each year to ensure their knowledge of revisions to the U.S. tax code. Through the program, federal and state returns are electronically filed (e-filed) and local income tax and property tax/rent rebate forms are prepared as needed. All returns are prepared using approved tax software.

Last year, the Tax Aide program assisted more than 1,100 people in Lycoming and Clinton Counties with their tax returns.

Appointments for tax preparation will be accepted starting in late January 2015. Actual tax preparation appointments will begin in February and run through the second week of April. People should contact the STEP Office of Aging at 570-323-3096 to schedule an appointment. Tax preparation will take place at the STEP office (lower level) at 2138 Lincoln Street, Williamsport.

# NCP HOSTS PUBLIC MEETING

# Is a "Quiet Zone" the Solution for Loud Train Horns?

The Newberry Community Partnership hosted a public meeting in November to explore the establishment of a Quiet Zone between Arch and Howard Streets and closing the Depot Street railroad crossing.

The by-product of increased train activity is the frequency of loud train horns, day and night; very disturbing to many residents living near the tracks. However, some residents at the meeting said they don't have a problem with it. They even enjoy the sound.

Residents met with city leaders, SEDA-COG representatives, rail line owners, and Lycoming Valley RR (train owners), to address possible solutions. SEDA-COG says it hopes to resolve the issue over coming months. The main solution on the table is to close the intersection of Depot Street to traffic and to create a quiet zone between Howard and Arch Streets. But since federal law requires trains to blow horns at intersections, the Arch and Howard Street intersections would need additional gates and lights to meet federal regulations.

"By improving the protection at the crossings and closing one of the less used crossings, we could have a so-called quiet zone, which means the trains go back and forth because of the increased protection without having to blow the horn at all," said Jeff Stover with SEDA-COG Joint Rail Authority. SEDA-COG estimates those safety measures could cost at least \$250,000.

More public meetings are planned to continue working on the horn issue.


