I LIVE IN A QUIET NEIGHBORHOOD?

Addressing Noise Concerns in Newberry

Sh – h-h-h is the sound of tires from vehicles going by on the street outside my house. According to a Google search: "decibel levels", this sound registers at 85 dB. At 35 mph it quickly goes away. A decibel is the numerical measure of the relative loudness of a sound. Vehicle traffic on a street can drown out bird song even in the morning when the birds are at their loudest.

On May 28th at 2:30 pm a Sunshine hearing was held involving representatives of the city of Williamsport and the PLCB (Pennsylvania Liquor Control Board) at the Hotel Kast. The city has petitioned the PLCB for an exemption from regulations regarding amplified music being heard from licensed establishments in the three entertainment zones created within city limits. The city asked that city police and the department of codes be allowed to enforce its own Ordinance 709 in place of regulations by the PLCB.

Under PLCB regulations, music and/or noise may not be heard outside a licensed establishment. The city amended Ordinance 709 and will monitor this using a decibel reader at 50 feet away from the place of business in a Residential Zoned District and 75 feet away from the place of business within a Commercially Zoned District. Those licensed businesses in the entertainment zone after applying and receiving a permit from the city would then be allowed to have music and/or outside dining and entertainment. A permit would be issued for a day's event that during the week could run from 12:00 noon to 10:00 pm and on a weekend could start again at noon and go until 11:00 pm. There is no limit to the number of permits that could be asked for or issued. The decibel level of the activities outside the licensed establishments should not exceed 67dBA. For those who don't have access to Google: "decibel levels: this is the sound level of normal conversation."

Over 16 persons, who live in and around the licensed establishments in Zone 3 (Newberry), attended the hearing. Several of the residents testified that there have been objections in the past about noise levels with patrons entering and leaving a business and around closing time. Also, there were concerns raised about enforcement of the noise level. The city, for both codes department and police, has only one instrument to measure sound level. It was stated that if the PLCB granted a waiver more devices would be purchased for the zones.

In the past when there may have been too much noise, residents felt comfortable contacting the owner or manager in charge about the problem of too much noise. Consequently, not one complaint was made to the Police Department.

Those who testified understood that these licensed establishments must find ways to attract customers to make enough income to remain in business, that they probably employ people from the neighborhood and offer within walking distance in Newberry good food, good company and a night out.

Most of those present at this hearing voted against the city's request to amend the PLCB regulation. To reach a decision about the city's petition to the PLCB will take as long as 60 days.

Until a decision is reached, the PLCB hot line will still handle all complaints about noise violations from licensed establishments within the entertainment zones in the city. The PLCB Hot Line is 800-932-0602.

Question: I am a grandparent who is very involved in my grandchildren's lives. I care for my grandkids after school most days. Do I have the authority to take them to their doctors' appointments? What if they need emergency medical treatment?

Answer:

Grandparents today are more involved in their grandchildren's lives than ever before. If a grandparent caregiver is not the legal guardian (or custodian) of a child, they are not able to give consent for medical or dental treatment. However, Pennsylvania's Medical Consent Act allows a parent to authorize another person to consent to this type of medical treatment for children.

Pennsylvania's Medical Consent Act allows a parent to authorize a grandparent to consent to medical, dental or mental health care for children and have access to any and all medical or insurance records regarding such services. Signing a Medical Consent allowing a grandparent to agree to medical treatment for a child does not affect the rights of the parents. A Medical Consent can be revoked at any time.

RECREATIONAL FIRES & BONFIRES

What's Allowed?

It's finally here, **summer**. And that means more barbeques, recreational fires and bonfires. In the City of Williamsport you are permitted to have recreational fires & bonfires as long as you follow the steps listed below.

The Williamsport Bureau of Fire urges all residents to practice *Fire Safety* if you do have any type of the following:

Recreational Fires

Recreational fires are defined as small fires used for either recreational use or cooking. Both types of fires are allowed in the City as long as the following guidelines are adhered to:

- · Charcoal or wood burning fires only.
- · Safeguards are in place and fire extinguishers are present.
- Fire does not give off noxious or offensive fumes or
- Fire is at least 15 feet away from any combustible materials and the property line.
- Fire pit is not more than 3 feet in diameter and 2 feet high.

· No burning of household items. (i.e. paper rubbish or garbage).

Manufactured fire pits or containers made of steel or brick are permitted for recreational uses. If a complaint is filed and the Fire Department responds and the Firefighters deem the fire to be a public nuisance, then the fire shall be extinguished.



WOOD BURNING PITS

Fires discharging smoke that creates public discomfort for neighboring properties could be extinguished.


Residents are allowed to construct their own fire pits. However they are required to be inspected **PRIOR** to the first use.

Any device that is not pre-manufactured must be pre-approved by the Fire Chief or Fire Marshal. Per Article 1513 of the Codified Ordinances.

Bonfires

Prior to the construction of any public bonfire, you

must secure an approved Bonfire Permit. Permits are required to be submitted at least 30 days in advance and must be approved by the Bureau of Fire.



Permits

Bonfire Permit applications are available in the Bureau of Codes Office located at City Hall, Lower Level, 245 West Fourth Street. Permit cost is \$75.00 per event. Violation of any rules and regulations set forth by the International Fire Code and the Williamsport Codified Ordinances could result in citations being issued and the fire being extinguished. Citation costs range from \$75 dollars to \$300 dollars.



New Trees and New Activities

Young trees and young children can be seen gracing the playground and green space in our neighborhood park.

Over 30 young trees arrived at the park in April, shortly after spring, in time to celebrate Arbor Day. Half the trees were gifted to the park from Dincher and Dincher, a local tree surgeon company that started in the garage of a house next to the park. A grant from the state Department of Conservation & Natural Resources, managed through Penn State Extension funded the balance.

Among the shade trees planted that will eventually form a canopy you'll find flowering tulip, also known as yellow poplar. Michael Dincher, professor of horticulture at Penn College of Technology, who oversaw more than a dozen Penn College students who did all aspects of the planting project commented, "It's fitting with Poplar Street being a short block away." Sugar and Armstrong maples were planted around the playground and elsewhere in the park.

In decades to come perhaps the youngsters of today will return to their childhood playground and marvel at the splendor of the mature tall trees that now offer respite from the sun's heat and recall the time when they were once all young together. A heartfelt thank you to the generations of the Dincher family for their generosity and vision.

Also new in the park this summer, the Williamsport Recreation Department will have two staff members present in the park Monday to Friday, 4:00 to 8:00 PM to generate play activities for children. Have fun!

CODES CORNER

Important Reminders

June 21st marked the official start of summer and the Williamsport Bureau of Codes would like to remind all residents:

1. All residents are to maintain their grass areas, such as front and rear and between the sidewalk and curb. Per the 2009 the Property

Maintenance Code it states that weed and plant growth shall not be more than 10 inches high. After mowing do not allow grass cuttings to remain on your sidewalk and do not sweep them into the gutter. Property owners are also required to remove weeds growing around fire hydrants.

2. Anyone wishing to put up a "Temporary" pool is required to obtain a Pool Permit from the Bureau of Codes prior to the set up of such pool. Applications are available in the office or online at www.Cityofwilliamsport.org.

- 3. Any resident who has a portable basketball hoop shall not put them in the public right-of way. Meaning that they shall not be placed along the side of the public road or along the alleyway where vehicular traffic passes or on a sidewalk.
- 4. Any and all garbage shall be kept and stored in approved garbage containers with close fitting lids at all times.
- 5. No unlicensed and/or uninspected vehicle is permitted to be on any property.

When violations are found, the City will give the owner and/or tenant a time frame to correct problem. For questions or to report a property, call 327-7517 or 327-7519 or email them at codes@cityofwilliamsport.org.
