

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ARCH STREET BRIDGE

New Bridge on the Way

While everyone's attention was focused on the construction of the Market Street bridge, I took a look at the historic gateway to Newberry – the Arch Street Bridge. (This, of course, before we learned that the bridge was slated for replacement).

Anyone who has wisely driven across the Arch Street Bridge to avoid the congestion on the Market Street and Maynard Street bridges knows that Newberry's oldest bridge can be uncomfortably narrow, and there's no denying that the bridge has been showing its age. That, unfortunately, is usually enough to start people thinking about a new bridge on Arch Street. After new bridges at Maynard and

Market Street, wasn't it Arch Street's turn? Well, yes – and a new bridge is coming, replacing a crucial part of historic Newberry.

If you've walked across the Arch Street Bridge, you know that our own Newberry Bridge is more than a way across the river. It's also a place to get up



close and personal with Newberry's river heritage, and an architectural treasure that has, admittedly, seen better days. So maybe it's time to remember the Arch Street Bridge in its former glory.

If you walk the Arch Street bridge from Newberry to Duboistown, you can immediately see traces of how the bridge used to be – the old light standards on the bridge are either missing or in unused disrepair. Try imagining how it was in the bridge's better days, when those classic columns of light led visitors from across the river into Newberry.

An early morning walk, with mist rising, ducks feeding, and fish splashing in the water will convince anyone that there's no better place in Williamsport to experience the Susquehanna River – on foot, at least – so before it's too late, why not take a walk on the bridge, just for old time's sake?

housing a farmers market and neighborhood watering trough.


This current version

A Mid-Year Recap

You have come to know and appreciate the West End Christian Community Center (WECCC) at 901 Diamond Street for all the services it offers our community and for providing space for various groups to meet regularly.

Since the beginning of 2009 the center has been the scene of many other events we'd like to share with you.

On April 4, John and Sylvia Confer celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary by renewing their vows at the WECCC. They were attended by their children, Scott, Barbara, John, and Diana; their grandchildren and great-grandchildren. Following the ceremony a reception was held in the fellowship hall for guests.

STEP hosted a "Poverty Simulation" training for their staff and guests on April 9th. This training was attended by approximately 60 to 65 individuals who learned what it felt like to be desperate and in need of help when dealing with everyday financial and emotional traumas. At the conclusion of the training, those attending said it taught them much about how to deal with those asking for assistance with an issue.

The Center was the site of a "Relay for Life" benefit on April 26th. Many vendors participated and donated their proceeds to the American Cancer Society.

The Center sanctuary, decorated beautifully with flowers and special lighting effects was the site of two weddings in May. Congratulations to the newlyweds.

May 31st was our 3rd Annual Patriotic Festival & Pig Roast. This event is our largest of the year and was well attended. Steve Hunter (Flashback Entertainment) was master of ceremonies for the program that featured singers, dancers and a martial arts demonstration. Veterans from WWII, Korean War, Vietnam Conflict,

Gulf War and our current wars in Iraq and Afghanistan spoke of their experiences

serving in our country's armed forces.
Center volunteers cooked and served barbequed pork sandwiches, hot dogs, baked beans, macaroni salad, dessert

and beverages. Additional food and craft vendors were on site. Children were entertained with games and face painting. Other activities included a novelty table; Quiz Your Knowledge on the Wars. Thank you to everyone for your support of the WECCC. Our mission is to help those in our community in their time of need. By helping others, you are helping yourself.



THE JOB PATH

Options for Finding Employment


Looking for a job is never easy or fun, but in our current tough economic times it can be even more frustrating. Here at the James V. Brown Library we've started a new program to address this situation.


The Job Path is a library project which connects people with the resources they need to search for the job they want. It provides presentations on the skills needed to find and get these jobs, and to keep them once they've been obtained. The Job Path website (http://www.lycolibrary.org/jobpath.html) has information on all aspects of becoming self-supporting. It has information on how to find jobs, how to start small businesses and information on evaluating and improving your job skills. The Job Path also has links to the top fifteen (by number of employees)local area employers and to other local employers.

The Job Path has computers available for job seekers to use to work on their resumes, research companies, evaluate their job skills and interests, along with other aspects of looking for work. In addition The Job Path has literature available about the requirements and outlook for specific jobs in Lycoming County, the central region of PA and in the Commonwealth as a whole.

In addition to the website, the computers and the literature, the library has numerous books, videos and online resources that can be used to aid in finding work. On any page in The Job Path website where you see the words "Search the Catalog" you will find guided searches through all the materials available in the Lycoming County Library System. These can be invaluable in enhancing a person's prospects for employment.

The Job Path also has regular Tuesday evening presentations on all aspects of searching for work. These programs are every Tuesday, from 6:30 PM to 7:30 PM in the Lowry Room on the third floor of the Kathryn Siegel Welch Wing at the James V. Brown Library. To see a list of the programs scheduled, just





click on "Job Path Programs" on the left-side list on the main Job Path webpage.

The Job Path is intended to act as a "portal" to information useful in gaining employment, no matter where the information comes from. That's why The Job Path affiliates with other groups and organizations in the area that are providing such information. Rather than duplicate their efforts, The Job Path promotes them and works with them.

A Reminder from our City's Codes Department

Although summer is upon us and we'd like to slow down a bit and take it easy, we still need to keep our property clean and maintained. There is a property maintenance code which applies to all properties in the City of Williamsport. This includes developed property and vacant lots.

Proper maintenance of your property includes the removal of rubbish and debris. Garbage is to be kept in approved covered containers and removed from your property weekly.

The exterior condition of your home, garage, business or any other structure should be free of peeling paint and in good structural condition. Please mow your lawn regularly so that the grass does not exceed 10 inches in height.

The City of Williamsport receives many calls concerning vehicles stored on properties. The regulations do not allow any unlicensed and /or un-inspected vehicle to be stored on private property or in the street right-of-way. In addition, vehicles cannot be in a state of major disassembly or damaged.

We are asking that all City residents, businesses and property owners take pride in their property. The way your property looks does affect your neighbors and surrounding area.


