Her stature in the community was such that when news of her passing reached City Hall, Mayor Gabriel Campana issued an executive order that the city’s flag be flown at half staff in her honor for the balance of the week, as a tribute to her life of service to God, family and community. “She was truly a pillar of Newberry and often had been called its mayor,” Campana said. “She will be missed but never forgotten.”

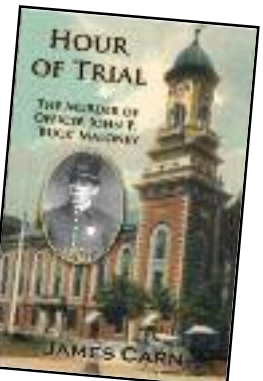

LOCAL AUTHOR RECOUNTS STORY OF NEWBERRY MURDER

The book, *Hour of Trial: the Murder of Officer John P. 'Buck' Maloney* by Magistrate James Carn is a thoroughly researched account of a local 1907 murder — the victim, a young police officer. Carn describes the crime spree that made George Nelson a wanted man. He tells how 'Buck' Maloney, a dedicated, plain clothes, Irish-American cop searched for him for months and found him near the former Philadelphia & Reading Railroad tracks in Newberry on a foggy night. When Buck got close enough to apprehend him, Nelson fired and killed him. Every aspect of the tragedy is described against the backdrop of names and places still familiar to our local citizens. The books covers the period from the 1860s when his parents came to America from Ireland through the 1920s when his parents passed away.



The author is a life long Williamsport resident and is a 25-year veteran of the Williamsport Bureau of Police, where he held the ranks of Sergeant, Lieutenant and Captain. Since 1998, he has served as a District Judge in Williamsport.

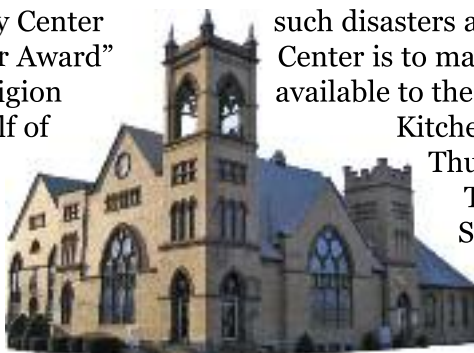
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WEST END CHRISTIAN COMMUNITY CENTER NEWS

Reminders for Summer Season

June 21st marked the official beginning of summer and the Williamsport Bureau of Codes would like to remind all residents of Newberry of a couple of items:



1. All residents are to maintain their grass areas, such as front and rear and between the sidewalk and curb. *Per the 2009 International Property Maintenance Code it states that weed and plant growth shall not be more than 6 inches.*



2. Anyone wishing to put up a "Temporary" pool is required to obtain a Temporary Pool Permit from the Bureau of Codes prior to the set up of such pool. Applications are available in the office or by visiting us online at www.Cityofwilliamsport.org.



3. Any resident who has a portable basketball hoop shall not put them in the public right-of way; meaning that they shall not be sitting along the side of the public road or along the alleyway where vehicular traffic passes by.



4. Any and all garbage shall be kept and stored in approved garbage containers with close fitting lids at all times.

WILLIAMSPORT CITIZENS CORPS COUNCIL (WCCC)

Citizens Corps, launched in 2002 following the terrorist attacks of 9/11, was created to help coordinate volunteer activities to make our communities safer, stronger and better prepared to respond to any emergency situation. It provides opportunities for people to participate in a range of measures to make their families, homes and communities safer from the threats of crime, terrorism and disasters of all kinds.



The Williamsport Citizens Corps Council (WCCC) was organized in 2008. They meet the last Tuesday of the month. In an effort to create convenience and encourage more participation, the WCCC will hold their meetings in a different neighborhood each month. The July 31st meeting will be held at the Trinity Gospel Church, corner of Brandon and Elmira Street; guest speaker Codes Official Joe Gerardi. The August 28th meeting will be held at the WECC Center, 901 Diamond Street; guest speaker Mike Knight of PA State Police. Future meetings will be listed in our calendar of events.

The meeting begins at 7:00 PM with members of City police and codes officers on hand to meet informally with citizens to discuss any problems they see in their neighborhood. This is followed by a formal WCCC meeting where agenda items such as activities, fundraising and organization business is discussed.

The primary purpose of the WCCC is to provide education and training for citizens. Local trainings are open to the public and led by members of the City's police and Fire departments; Captain Tim Miller leads the Volunteers in Policing (VIPS), Corporal Damon Hagen trains Neighborhood Watches and the Community Emergency Response Teams (CERT) Program is led by Asst. Fire Chief Todd Heckman. "I found the CERT training very informative and helpful, said Sally Wiegand, WCCC Secretary. This hands on training is very helpful for citizens who are often the first responders to an emergency such as a fire, local or National Disaster. We learn to deal with emergencies and to help citizens who may be in need."

Neighborhood watches are organized to be alert to all aspects of neighborhood life not just crime. For instance an elderly person living alone or a neighbor who is ill may need help with mowing the grass or shoveling snow; or being vigilant about codes violations.

WCCC's newly elected officers are, Jeff Reeder, President; Cassie Carpenter, Vice President, Sally Wiegand, Secretary, and Bill Henderson Treasurer.

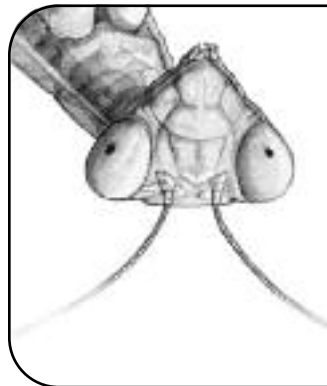

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TIPS FOR OUTDOOR SUMMER ACTIVITIES

Think of Safety First...And You'll Enjoy Summer Events A Lot More!

Summertime is here!!! Get outside and enjoy the great outdoors; especially those video game playing kids! When we think of summer, we think of cookouts, swimming pools, campfires, and yard work. Each of these fun times can turn ugly in an instant. The Fire Prevention Division of the Williamsport Bureau of Fire offers these simple safety tips:

COOKOUTS

- Don't wear loose fitting clothing while cooking.
- Charcoal and gas grills are not permitted to be used on combustible (wood) balconies or covered porches or within 10 feet of combustible construction (one- and two-family dwellings are exempt from this regulation).
- Follow manufacturer's instructions when using gas grills.
- Inspect the grill before each use. Damaged or corroded tanks should be replaced and not used.
- Spare tanks should be stored upright and away from the grill in a cool, shaded location.
- Always close tank valves when not in use.
- Always allow lighter fluid to penetrate the charcoal for 5 – 10 minutes before lighting and never add fluid once the fire has been started. Fire could flash back to the container and cause an explosion.
- **NEVER USE GASOLINE TO START A FIRE!!!**



POOLS & AIR CONDITIONING

- Liquid and solid chlorine-based pool chemicals can spontaneously combust if they come in contact with organic materials like urine and fertilizers or contact with hydrocarbon liquids like motor oil or fuel oil.
- Keep chemical containers stored in a dry area (NOT IN THE HOME), well away from other chemicals.
- Window AC units must be plugged directly into a receptacle. If one cannot be reached, an "Appliance Extension Cord" can be purchased at any home building center, but it must specify "Appliance Extension Cord."
- Have AC units serviced each annually.
- Have a flashlight available, instead of matches and candles, for use as emergency lighting.



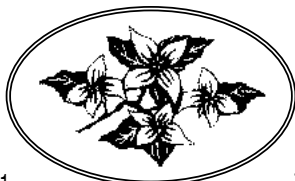
LAWN MOWERS & OTHER OUTDOOR EQUIPMENT

- Never refuel your mower when it is running or hot.
- Only refuel it outside in a well ventilated area; not in a shed or garage.
- Gasoline vapors are heavier than air, so they will travel along the ground and can be ignited by a nearby ignition source.
- Store only enough gasoline to power lawn equipment and **NEVER STORE IT INSIDE THE HOUSE.**
- Don't smoke while refueling power equipment.
- Supervise children when Tiki Torches and/or Citronella Candles are in use. Do not let children run in the area of the Torches or Candles.

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A MESSAGE FROM VOTER SERVICES: NEW VOTER ID LAW

Photo ID Required for November 2012 Election – ALL Voters will be Required to Show a Photo ID Before Voting at a Polling Place

All photo IDs must contain an **expiration date** that is **current**, unless noted otherwise. Acceptable IDs include:

- Photo IDs issued by U.S. Federal Government or Commonwealth of Pennsylvania:

Pennsylvania driver's license or non-driver's license photo ID (IDs are valid for voting purposes 12 months past expiration date)

Valid U.S. passport

U.S. military ID - active duty and retired military (a military or veteran's ID must designate an expiration date or designate that the expiration date is indefinite). Military dependents' ID must contain an expiration date

- Employee photo ID issued by Federal, PA, County or Municipal government
- Photo ID cards from an accredited Pennsylvania public or private institution of higher learning
- Photo ID cards issued by a Pennsylvania care facility, including long-term care facilities, assisted living residences or personal care homes

If you do not have one of these IDs and require one for voting purposes, you may be entitled to get one **FREE OF CHARGE** at a PennDOT Driver License Center. For the Center nearest you, and to learn what identification and residency documentation you will need to get a photo ID, **visit the PennDOT Voter ID website** or call the Department of State's Voter ID Hotline at 1-877-VotesPA (1-877-868-3772).

NO ONE legally entitled to vote will be denied the right to do so. If you do not have a photo ID or are indigent and unable to obtain one without payment of



a fee, you may cast a **provisional ballot**, and will have six days to provide your photo ID and/or an affirmation to your county elections office to have your ballot count. If you have a religious objection to being photographed you can still vote by presenting a valid without-photo driver's license or a valid without-photo ID card issued by PennDOT. If you plan on voting by **Absentee Ballot** on the November 6, 2012 General Election, you will need to provide proof of identification. Be sure to see what identification is required by the Voter ID Law.
