#### **ELM STREET MANAGER NAMED**

#### Alannah Gabriel Hired to Fill Position

Williamsport's Mayor Gabriel J. Campana, John Grado, Director of Economic & Community Development and the Newberry Community Partnership (NCP) announce the hiring of Alannah Gabriel as Elm Street Manager for Newberry.

Alannah has played a major role in securing the Elm Street designation for Newberry. Her involvement began in 2005 with the Organizational Development team, whose mandate was to structure a neighborhood organization to help guide



neighborhood planning and development into the future. The result was the creation and establishment of the NCP in 2006. Alannah was elected and served as its first President of the Board for two years.

Within the first four months the NCP began the application process to attain Elm Street designation for Newberry. Alannah acted as liaison between the NCP and the City's DECD to provide data and documentation for the application and helped develop a budget for the Elm Street grant. She represented the NCP to representatives of PA Downtown Center (PDC) and the state's Department of Community & Economic Development to define Newberry's Elm Street boundaries, which are (East-Lycoming Creek, North-W.4th Street, South-Trenton Avenue, West-Poplar Street and including the commercial intersections at Arch Street to 3rd Street and north to Hillside Avenue).

In December 2007, the NCP received the good news that the NCP was granted Elm Street designation and a \$150,000 Administrative Grant, which

provides funds for three years to cover the cost of maintaining an office in the West End Christian Community Center and to hire and train a full time Elm Street manager. The Elm Street Program is a component of Gov. Ed Rendell's \$2.8 billion economic stimulus package.

Alannah's training has already begun. She attended New Manager training in September, at PDC in Harrisburg. The PDC provides services and education to members to enable them to build stronger core communities. She will be attending Revitalization Academies throughout the first year. The Academies provide the specialized training needed to develop and implement effective community revitalization programs.





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#### NEWBERRY KICKS-OFF ITS FIRST CIGARETTE LITTER PREVENTION PROGRAM

Cigarette Litter Prevention Month Proclaimed by Mayor

The Newberry Community
Partnership's (NCP) Beautification
Team, headed by Wendy Decker
spent the summer implementing Keep
America Beautiful's Program to decrease
cigarette butt litter, America's most littered item.

NCP team members, Carla Mitchelltree, Carmella Preziosi and Jennifer Young tallied cigarette butts in popular and busy areas on Arch St. from Newberry to Third Street and West Fourth Street from Monument Square to Diamond Street. The effort was supported by the Dollar Bazaar, Newberry Hotel, Keller's Diner, Puff's Discount, Uni-Mart, Fredrick's Tavern, Kast Hotel and the West End Christian Community Center.

After the tally, ash receptacles were installed. The team also distributed 1000 FREE Pocket Ashtrays to adult smokers in the area.

A recount of cigarette butts on the same streets to assess the difference the letter prevention plan made revealed a significant reduction in cigarette butt litter – in some locations over 50%, Wendy reported. "We were gratified that so many of the stakeholders in the neighborhood embraced the program," said Wendy.

Mayor Campana acknowledged the community's efforts by proclaiming September Cigarette Litter Prevention Month and urged all citizens to recognize the positive effect reducing litter in our neighborhoods will have.

The Cigarette Litter Prevention program was funded by a Keep America Beautiful, Inc. (KAB) \$1,500 grant. KAB, which was established in 1953, is the nation's largest volunteer-based community action and education organization. With a network of nearly 1,000 affiliate and participating organizations, KAB forms public-private partnerships and programs that engage individuals to take a greater responsibility for improving community environments. **Note from the Editor:** This is the first in a series of articles highlighting the five elements of focus for the Citizens Corps Council. The council meets the last Tuesday of each month (except December) at 7:30 PM in City Council Chambers.

Citizen Corps Councils helps drive local citizen participation by coordinating Citizen Corps programs, developing community action plans, assessing possible threats and identifying local resources.

The Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) program is administered by FEMA's Community Preparedness. CERT is a training program that prepares people to help themselves, their families and their neighbors in the event of a disaster in their community. Through CERT, citizens can learn about disaster preparedness and receive training in basic disaster response skills



such as fire safety, light search and rescue, and disaster medical operations. With this training, volunteers can provide critical support by giving immediate assistance to victims before emergency First

Responders arrive on scene. CERT volunteers also support the community year-round by participating in community preparedness outreach activities and distributing materials on disaster preparedness and education. For more information visit:

#### **BEHIND THE SCENES**

#### Making the Voting Experience Happen

We were interested to know what it takes to provide a smooth and seamless voting experience for our citizens. *insideNewberry* reached 8th Ward Judge of Election Marianne Tupper and Eloise Snauffer 7th Ward Judge for an overview. In general, this is what happens:

- Five or six workers comprise the Election Board One Judge of Election, two inspectors, a Clerk, and one Machine Inspector. A Constable is present at all times during the election.
- The Election Judges attend seminars to learn of any changes to the (mechanically sensitive) voting machines; gain hands-on experience with them and receive new brochures.
- Friday before Election Day, the Judge of Election picks up the voting machines and all supplies for their ward from the Voter Registration Office.
- Monday night the election room is partially set up.
- Election Day morning, 6:00 to 6:30 AM, the workers arrive to set up the voting machines and prepare for the voters to arrive.
- Throughout the day, trained Election Overseers visit each ward to see that everything is going smoothly or to bring more supplies if needed. Each polling place maintains an open phone line to the Voter Registration Office in the event any question arises about a voter's registration or to direct a voter to his/her correct polling place.

 All the workers remain at the polling place after the polls close at 8:00 PM until around 9:00 PM - maybe a little earlier or later – depending on voter turn out. From 8:00 PM until all the work is done, the time is • The Judge of Election and the Minority Inspector are responsible for returning the machines and all paper work to the Voter Registration Office. All supplies must be accounted for - down to the pens and paper clips!

"Every year we say, this is the last one," said Eloise Snauffer, with a big laugh. She and her husband have worked the 7th Ward for seven years. "In spite of all the responsibility and long hours we really have fun," she said. "The voters are wonderful. We watch them arrive with an air of focus and responsibility. After they've voted, they seem more relaxed, having done their civic duty." It's not uncommon to have voters bring cookies and snacks for workers, who provide their own meals. Because they never leave the polling place, some wards prepare a pot luck meal, others order out for pizza and subs. All in all, it's a satisfying and rewarding day.

"Lycoming County is very fortunate to have a well-trained and dedicated group of election officials at the polls on Election Day to instruct you," Sandy Adams of Voter Services told *insideNewberry*. That is certainly true of our neighbors who serve the 6th, 7th and 8th Wards here in Newberry.

If anyone is interested in helping on the election board there will be a sign-up sheet located at the polling place.

Let's all get out and vote November 4, 2008!

#### **VOTING DATES & REMINDERS**

To assist our residents to prepare for what is already billed as an historic election, Sandy Adams, Director of Elections and Registration for Lycoming County has sent along these important dates and reminders:

- MONDAY, OCTOBER 6 at 5:00 PM is the last day to register or make changes to your registration before the November 4, 2008 Presidential Election.
- TUESDAY, OCTOBER 28 at 5:00 PM is the last day before the election an absentee ballot application can be received in the Voter Services Office, Executive Plaza, 330 Pine Street in downtown Williamsport.
- TUESDAY, NOVEMBER 4 ELECTION DAY Polls open from 7:00 AM until 8:00 PM. If you arrive at the polls during busy times which are early morning, lunchtime, early evening, and at the close, you will have to wait in line. Consider voting in off-peak times.
- The Judge of Elections must close the polling place promptly at 8:00 PM. All persons standing in line at the time the polls close will be permitted to vote.
- Please be prepared for inclement weather.
- While in line, take the opportunity to review the information posted, as well as the voting machine instructions and sample ballots.
- If you are not sure if you are registered to vote or where to vote, call Lycoming County Voter Services 327-2267.
- Sample Ballots are on display and available at Voter Services one week prior to the election.

#### **KNOW BEFORE YOU VOTE**

**IDENTIFICATION** – If you are a newly registered voter or voting in an election district for the first time, you must show an approved form of photo or non-photo ID. For a complete list of approved ID, call Toll Free 877-868-3772 or Lycoming County Voter Services, 570-327-2267.

**VOTING INSTRUCTIONS:** For instructions on voting correctly visit Voter Services, Executive Plaza, 330 Pine Street in downtown Williamsport or visit the following website: <a href="https://www.lyco.org/lyco/site">www.lyco.org/lyco/site</a>.


**EMERGENCY BALLOTS:** Can be issued under some circumstances (of course, you must still be registered):

- 1.) If you are 65 years of age or older and disabled you may be eligible to vote by Alternative ballot if you are assigned to an inaccessible polling place.
- 2.) If an emergency arises after the deadline for absentee ballots, you have until 8:00 PM on Election Day to apply for an Emergency Ballot at the county Board of Elections. If illness is the reason, the application will need a physician's signature. If absence from the municipality is the reason the application will need to be notarized.





#### Then and Now - How School Lunches Have Changed

Recently a lunch ticket was found that dated back to the early 1960's. Finding the artifact told us that milk used to cost 5 or 6 cents. The "main lunch" at that time cost only 35 cents and soup with crackers was 10 cents. Lunch was simple, with very few choices for the students....how things have

changed!

This year in the Williamsport Area School District, students have many choices for lunch. On the first day of school this year, the elementary students could choose from the following:

> Cheese Steak Sandwich • Cheeseburger Ham & Cheese Hoagie • Peanut Butter & Jelly Sandwich

All of these selections are offered with a choice of two servings of fruits and vegetables and a container of low fat milk. The cost for a school lunch is \$1.80. If students want to just buy milk, they must pay 45¢. However,

families may apply to receive free or reduced price meals at school.

Recently, while visiting the Jackson cafeteria, I asked students, "Of all the lunches we serve in our cafeteria, what is your favorite?" Nachos with beef, tomatoes, lettuce and cheese, was the number one reply. This meal is served with rice and corn. Pizza with salad and fruit was a close second. In addition to lunch, breakfast is also served at school. For \$1.00, students can eat a nutritious meal and enjoy conversation with their friends. An example of our school breakfast is:

Waffle with Syrup • Turkey Sausage Links • Fruit or Juice • Low Fat Milk

Many of our Jackson students do eat breakfast at school. We know that students learn better when their bellies are full, so we are very thankful to have healthy food for our students prepared right here at Jackson School!

This is a wonderful way to usher in the holiday season and honor it's spiritual significance. The general public is invited.

## West Branch School Butterfly Watch Way-Station

For the last half-decade, West Branch School (WBS) students have partnered with Monarch Watch, an international organization that tracks monarch butterfly migratory patterns in North America. Our students maintain a small patch of milkweed around the outside of the building (where the butterflies lay eggs and caterpillars eat). They nurture the caterpillars, tag them when they emerge as butterflies, and release them to migrate to Mexico.

We'd like to become the region's only Monarch Watch-certified Way-station. This Way-station would function as both an outdoor classroom for our students and community butterfly garden for Newberry. We lack room on our own property to dedicate to this project because all of our open space is used for our playground.

Recently, the WBS applied for an easement from the City of Williamsport to utilize the grassy area across from our school within the Glynn Avenue Extension. We were approved! This is exciting news, since we can now move forward with the project. Constructing the outdoor classroom space also goes a long way toward protecting that green-space from future development.

To accomplish this vision, we seek help in three areas:

- 1) We need green-thumbed alumni and community members willing to work with our students to design two spaces; a milkweed garden and a space with native plants to attract other butterflies and wildlife.
- 2) Handy folks who can build a covered space, such as a gazebo, carve some benches and create signage.
- 3) Ideas for funding the project.

"I hope you, like me, see this as an amazing opportunity for our students and community, said Jeff Klein, the school's Director and prime mover for the project. Please respond if you know folks we should contact or have any ideas for this exciting venture."

#### WBS to Host Monthly Family Music

Options for entertaining the kids are much improved for the next 10 months. Thanks to a generous grant from the First Community Foundation of Lycoming County, families can bring their children to see free performances at West Branch School (WBS) every second Saturday of the Month. Performances began on September 13 and last through June. Each Family music weekend offers an afternoon of singing, dancing, stories and more.

"We thought it would be a great idea to offer free music as often as possible during the school year," says Jeff Klein, Executive Director. "When I moved here from the West Coast 4 years ago, it seemed there were fewer children's performers doing their thing on weekends for free. It's important to have things to do with your kids on weekends to get out of the house. Seeing musicians for free kept me sane while raising my daughter, Lily."

As part of an open house, WBS hosted performer KJ and storyteller Fullis Conroy in January of 2008. Over 40 people attended that event, both West Branch students and members of the community. That success inspired Klein to seek funding to open the doors of the school to families in the community more often for free performances. "We try to be as community-focused as possible," says Klein. "Our annual fair and music festival draws hundreds of people, as do our plays at the Community Theater League."

Robert M. Sides Family Music Center also is helping to co-sponsor the event. Many familiar regional musicians round out the performing schedule. October brings Flora Eyster, a Milton-area performer with a background in Celtic and flute music. She will bring many different varieties of flutes for a demonstration and performance. November features Mary Knysh who has performed her South American, Caribbean, and Africaninfluenced music for audiences all over the east coast. She says she is happy to support this "wonderful idea" of free music for families. West Branch's Steve Hulslander kickedoff the performances in September with classic sing-along songs. Other artists scheduled to perform include Allie Weiler, on December 13th with her new album, Down at the Tool Shed, a new DVD for kids, is sure to be fun. In 2009, Earl Pickens, Eric Sundburg, KJ, and Steve Mitchell will all play at WBS.



- •1 Cup Water
- Red Food Coloring
- Candy Thermometer

Use clean well rinsed & dry apples. Insert popsicle sticks through apple core.



Combine sugar, syrup and water in pan. Heat and stir until sugar is dissolved. Cover & cook 3 minutes. Uncover and cook over medium heat. Cook till mixture reaches 290° on thermometer. Remove from heat. Add food coloring until you achieve desired color. Immediately dip & twirl apples in mixture to coat. Place on wax paper or tin foil until hard. *Enjoy!*

The Newberry Lions Club is back in full swing, after another very successful 2007/08 fiscal year.


The Newberry Lions Carnival in June was one of our biggest and best. The weather was great and we had one of the longest parades on record. Thanks for your support!


Last year the Newberry Lions
