WEST END CHRISTIAN COMMUNITY CENTER NEWS

\$2500 Grant Helps Preserve an Important Piece of Newberry History

The West End Community Center (WECCC) founded less than five years ago, has quickly become the heart of Newberry. The facility houses numerous programs, services and organizations that meet the spiritual, physical and social needs of our community. It provides a home for a James V. Brown Satellite Library, The Newberry Community Partnership Elm Street Revitalization Program, North Western PA Optical Clinic, a thrift shop, café and family clothing shop that draws both young and old. Groups such as the Young Marines, Point Man Ministries, Alcoholics & Narcotics Anonymous meet here regularly.

Until a merger with St. John's United Methodist Church in July 2004, the structure was Newberry United Methodist Church, the second oldest church in Lycoming County. Founded in 1854 and rebuilt in 1898, the building is an architectural and historic landmark in need of preservation. "The sanctuary's 150-year-old stained glass windows and surrounding woodwork are in critical need of repair," says Marge Thompson, Executive Director of WECCC.

An appraiser who examined the windows believes they originated in Germany. One panel

maintain the building's beautiful architectural design," Ms. Thompson says. "This grant will allow the WECCC to preserve an important piece of our community's history." The repairs will also help weatherize the building providing cost savings and ensuring the WECCC will continue its community programs. The grant will provide a hydraulic lift, paint brushes and other materials for this historic preservation project.

I REMEMBER...

School Lunch Memories

While kitchen-testing recipes for our third family cookbook, *Branching Out*, I came across a recipe for Johnny Marzetti, submitted by Violet Ennis, who is a friend of my mother.

I was transported forty-odd years back in time to the Jackson School cafeteria, meal tray in hand, waiting for the cafeteria lady to hand me my steaming plate of that wonderfully delicious baked dish of pasta, meat sauce and cheese. It was ALWAYS served with a school-made roll and butter, tossed salad, and either apple or cherry crisp. Oh, how I loved the flavor of that slightly sweet tomato and meat sauce, blended with the pasta and gooey cheese, And that light, yeasty school-made roll with REAL butter, along with the tossed salad were the perfect compliments to that savory dish. The fruit crisp at the end was a bowl of goopy pie filling topped with a crunchy topping and was the grand finalé to the meal.

Other cafeteria favorites in my family included turkey with stuffing and gravy, chicken gravy over mashed potatoes, ham and green beans, and fish sticks with macaroni and cheese. Every week, each of us received a brown envelope marked "Monday through Friday". The school menu was printed in the Sun-Gazette on Sunday, and we would each have to decide which days to buy lunch and which days to carry lunch. This was complicated by the fact that money was tight, so each of us could buy lunch on two days. (Remember, the price for a school lunch was ten cents.)

At lunch time, each class lined up in the hallway outside the cafeteria. As the line moved forward, you picked up a metal tray and flatware, slid your tray along the railing, and waited for the cafeteria lady to hand you your plate (if you were carrying lunch, you had could pick up either white or chocolate milk). You then handed your envelope to the cafeteria cashier - who was Angie Bongiovi for as long as I can remember - and moved to a table. This was an opportunity to talk with friends, tell jokes, share family stories, and shoot the occasional straw paper across the table.

The last time I visited a school cafeteria was when my son, Andy, was in high school. The cafeteria had a salad bar, a taco bar, a baked potato bar, and a make-your-own-sundae bar. This was in addition to fresh pizza from the local bakery, and the regular menu being served. Beverages included bottled water, soft drinks, and fresh lemonade. The cost for lunch was significantly higher than ten cents. And I seriously doubt that any of the students there had ever tasted Johnny Marzetti. Their loss!

MONUMENT SQUARE BELL BACK IN PLACE


Newberry Landmark Rejuvenated



Lincoln Senior Community Center Serves 80 Meals on Wheels Monday thru Friday

Serving a hot noontime meal to the homebound 60 year old or older who can't cook takes place every morning at the STEP Building (formerly the Lincoln School) 2138 Lincoln Street. The Meals on Wheels service paid for thru donations, lottery dollars, state and federal funds serve two very important purposes. One is the nutritious 1/3 RDA meal and the other is the human contact made with the delivery. Many Driver and Driver Assistants get to know our community's homebound older citizens. When a route change occurs it is upsetting to some to not see their noontime contacts because their route does not have them as a stop anymore. They may only volunteer once a week for one to two hours but and understanding and liking of the meal recipients develops over time. Some meals on wheels seniors receive the service for a short time while recovering from an illness but the majority have been receiving meals for a long time and look forward to the volunteer's knock on the door.

There are seven routes and fifty different volunteers who deliver meals throughout the West End and parts north. All routes have approximately 16 meals to deliver and usually take between 45 and



75 minutes to complete and return. All routes have two people on them, a driver and a driver assistant. The assistant takes the meals into the home while the driver waits in the vehicle.

Mileage is reimbursable at the discretion of the driver. In the event that there is no contact made the volunteers are trained to notify the senior center manager ASAP who will call the home or their emergency contact. It is treated as if the homebound person is down in their home so every effort is made to find out if the person is all right.

Come join the volunteers at Lincoln and give your heart some exercise!

2009 TIADAGHTON QUILT SHOW ANNOUNCED

Show Slated for October

Every two years the Tiadaghton Quilt Guild exhibits the handiwork of it members. The quilters choose to work in categories such as Challenge and Mystery Quilts, Holiday, Bed, Wall Hangings and other themes. A lucky someone will take home a hand quilted bed-size quilt, the Raffle grand prize.

A Silent Auction of small quilts and quilt bags of "goodies" will also be held. Vendors will be on hand with sewing machines, fabrics, notions, patterns and scissor sharpening service.

The show will be held October 16-18 at Penn College's Field House Building.

A "Meet the Quilters" Reception (\$3 admission) will be held Friday evening from 6-9 PM to launch the show. Hours are Saturday 10 AM-6 PM; Sunday 10 AM-4 PM. Plenty of free parking and food available. General admission \$5; Students \$3. Children under 12 free.

The guild was founded in 1990 to promote quilt making and preservation in Pennsylvania. Regular meetings include business, sharing of quilts, and a quilt-related presentation or activity. Guild members enjoy fall and spring retreats at Camp Susque, workshops to learn new quilting

techniques from local and national quilters, and make quilts for charity. Their charitable quilting is currently focused on Quilts of Valor and The Gatehouse.

Quilts of Valor, a volunteer organization, has awarded over 23,000 wartime quilts to wounded soldiers. The quilts are made by quilters from all over the world and sent to veteran's hospitals or forwarded to operating bases and given to soldiers by military chaplains. The quilts are given to the soldiers during their recovery process and are theirs to keep. Tiadaghton Quilt Guild has made and donated 75 quilts in the last three years. Quilts are also given to local soldiers who come home to recover and have never received a quilt.


The Gatehouse is the hospice unit at Divine Providence Hospital. Quilts are given to hospice patients and kept by their families. Since the inception of The Gatehouse, the Guild has donated 16 quilts annually.

The Guild meets at 7 PM, the first Wednesday of the month at St. Matthew Lutheran Church, corner of Linn & Pearl Street. Everyone is invited to attend. Information is posted at <u>www.tquiltguild.org</u>.



VACANCY NOTICE FOR ELECTION BOARD WILLIAMSPORT 7

One of the most difficult obstacles to overcome in conducting quality elections in Lycoming County is obtaining and retaining individuals willing to serve as poll workers. Lycoming County loses election workers for a variety of reasons in the weeks leading up to an election, including the day before the election.

Vacancies have occurred on the Election Board at the Williamsport 7 Polling Location, Roosevelt Middle School for the November 3 Municipal Election. Workers receive a minimum of \$77 to \$110 for working each Election Day. Please call the county election office at 570-327-2267 if you are interested. Duties include:

JUDGE OF ELECTION:

The Judge of Election is in charge of all Election Activities and personnel inside the polls. The judge opens and closes the polls and is responsible for the paperwork and delivering the election supplies to the Voter Services Office.

INSPECTORS OF ELECTION:

The Majority and Minority Inspectors will normally manage the district register and the numbered list of voters.

CLERKS:

Clerks are appointed one each to the Majority and Minority Inspector and may be assigned to fill in the Numbered List of Voters or manage district register.

MACHINE OPERATOR(s):

Encodes voter access cards.
