IN MEMORIAM

LCpl. Abram L. Howard

We pay tribute and acknowledge the passing of LCpl. Abram L. Howard, a military policeman with the Police Mentoring Team, 2nd Battalion, 6th Marine Regiment, who died while conducting combat operations in Helmand province, Afghanistan, July 27, 2010. He was the son of Bart and Connie Howard and brother of Alexander J. and Olivia M. Howard of 1 Round Hill Road, Williamsport, PA.

The out pouring of love, honor and respect that was demonstrated through out the region at the loss of LCpl. Abram Howard was felt most intensely in our Newberry neighborhood where he grew up.

The sweltering noon heat of August 4th did not deter the young or old as they began to gather all along the published route through the neighborhood, waiting to receive their hero as he made is final journey home. Flags large and small were everywhere; lining the curbs, flying from porches and held by onlookers. Local commerce slowed to a snail's pace or halted for several hours.

The impressive official procession with helicopter escort, in addition to LCpl. Howard's family, included the US Marine Corps, PA State Police, Williamsport Bureau of Police, Lycoming County Sheriff, South Williamsport PD, Old Lycoming PD and over 100 Patriot Guard Riders.

In anticipation of a large turnout of those who wished to pay their respects to the Howard family, the visitation was held at the Williamsport Area High School. Scheduled hours were 3 PM to 8 PM but mourners began gathering well before the slated time - the last mourner departed at 11:30 PM.

From the eulogy written by his Uncle and Godfather Joseph Dincher, the recollections from his comrades-in-arms or the moving homily delivered by the Rev. Shane Kirby at the Mass of Christian Burial at St. Joseph the Worker Parish-**Annunciation Church** on Friday, August 6, 2010, what follows are edited excerpts from those tributes.

From Uncle Joe's Eulogy on behalf of the Howard Family

Abe touched everyone's life in so many ways. He was a son, brother, nephew, cousin, friend, Marine and a hero. Abe lived life to the fullest. Beyond those titles, we also knew him as a kindhearted, sympathetic, loving, and caring soul.

In order to comfort his family during his deployment to Afghanistan, Abe made daily calls home to assure them everything was all right and to catch up on family news. Out of respect, love and devotion for his grandparents, Mimi and PopPop (Bernie and Helen Dincher), he called weekly to reassure them all was well with him and to confirm all was well on the home front.

As his Godfather, I'm so proud to learn that the Bible I sent to him while he was in Afghanistan was received with such devotion that he led his platoon in reading scripture everyday before and after they went out on patrol- with a great emphasis on Psalms 91.

I learned even more about my nephew Abram while sitting with my sister Connie, when she received a phone call from Abram's fellow Marines in Afghanistan a few days after his death. A young Marine from his unit informed Connie that Abram's selfless act of courage saved the lives of at least 2-3 other Marines.

As we have gathered with friends and family the stories we've heard about Abe's endearing heart were endless.

He made friends everywhere in the community. For instance, on the way home from school, he would stop at Paul's Corner Market, sometimes to buy penny candy but most often just to stop and say "Hi" and carry on a conversation, making sure everyone was well.

He took friends under his wing during their trying times and helped them through their situations. So often, we heard how Abe was there from the beginning to the end. Never judging, just helping them through their plight, leading them in a better direction.

Abe followed in his parents' footsteps, picking up their loving, kind and joyful outlook on life; always welcoming people with open arms into the household and making them a part of the family.

But lets not forget to give Abe the glory he would so much want to be remembered by - being known as an instigator, antagonizer and prankster, who loved the limelight. Yes, believe it, Abe was an instigator! His cousin Jeff recalls a time when Abe planned to steal his father's beer for a day trip up to the cabin with Alex, Jeff, and PopPop. Abe explained to Alex and Jeff, "We'll wait for PopPop to fall asleep and then its back to the fort." Years later Jeff explained, "We didn't get wasted. Instead, all three beers were wasted." Jeff claimed that they all took a sip and spat it out. I guess beer shouldn't taste good to 2 seven year olds and a five year old. It was just one of many experiences the three boys would share.

The family always told the boys that they were the "Three Amigos" or as Alex recalled, "The First Trifecto." Guess what Abe, that Trifecto still exists. You may have left your brother Alex and cousin Jeff's side but in moving from their side you have moved into their hearts, where you will never be forgotten. You have moved from their side to take the higher ground where we know you will not fail in protecting them throughout their life's journey.

When Abe was stationed in Afghanistan, it didn't slow him down from thinking up pranks. In a phone conversation with his father they talked about some of things he wanted to do when he got home. Bart asked, "So tell me, what is one of the very first things you want to do?" His reply, "I'm going to dig a fighting hole in Uncle Joe's front yard and plead Post Traumatic Stress Disorder. That way I can get away with it."

We know that Abe loves every minute of the attention he is receiving right now. If Abe could have planned his own funeral, this would have been it – a motorcade, TV, media, lights, cameras and action.

Well, here's to you Mr. Hollywood. The world is your stage, now and forever.

We can leave Abe today with our hearts at peace, with the words of Jesus from John 15:11-13 "I have told you this so that my joy might be in you and your joy might be complete. This is my commandment: love one

another as I love you. No one has greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends."

Abe, when your drill instructor taught you how to serve your country - it was God, Country, Corps. You served your country. Because of your unselfish act, you have paid the ultimate price. You gave this country that you so much loved, your life. LCpl. Howard, you have new orders now, so it's time for us to say goodbye. God has called upon you to guard the gates of Heaven. When you see Saint Peter to him you will say, "Another Marine reporting, sir. I have served my time in Hell." So Abe, carry on and may God bless you. Semper Fi! We love you.

Fallen Marine Remembered as Jokester, Athlete, Friend

MARJAH, Afghanistan – A memorial service for Lance Cpl. Abram L. Howard was held at the Marjah District government center in Marjah, Afghanistan, Aug. 12.

The 21-year-old Marine was remembered as a standout athlete, a humorous storyteller, and most importantly, a great friend to his fellow Marines.

"He's the type of guy you know would have your back, no matter what," said Cpl. Andrew J. Gales, a military policeman and Howard's team leader with PMT, 2/6. "Abe, I'll miss you, brother."

"He excelled at all things, but was greatest at being a friend," said Cpl. Greg Safron, also with PMT, 2/6. "I'll miss my little, big brother, but I know he's watching over us and waiting in a better place."


A team jokester and humorous storyteller, Howard always found ways to make his fellow Marines smile, during good times and bad.

"One time he was working out with his shirt off, and a gunny came by and yelled, 'Howard, you look like a Spartan!' That only fueled his ego," Gales said.

"He told us a story about his first match in varsity wrestling. His plan was to go in, shoot aggressively, take him down and intimidate him. He didn't know that his opponent had placed in the state championships. So when he went to go to shoot, he took a hard crossface and found himself on his back. His coach yelled at him, 'welcome to varsity, son!" Safron said.

"The only thing that separates us from being brothers was blood," said Cpl. Shane Weyant, a military policeman with PMT, 2/6.

While conducting research on Howard for a personal letter to his parents, Lt. Col. Kyle B. Ellison, the commanding officer of 2/6, realized he had a lot more in common with Howard.




"I do not claim to have known this Marine in the physical form, only as a name on a roster, or in passing on a patrol," Ellison admitted. "As I wrote a letter to his parents, I began to feel a connection, and by the end, I felt I knew him."

Much like Ellison, The six-foot, one-inch tall Howard was deeply involved in sports throughout his childhood and teenage years, Howard stood out as an excellent 189-pound varsity wrestler at Williamsport Area High School.

The Marine Corps runs deep in both family lineages. Howard was the 13th member of his family to have earned the title of United States Marine. He kept his father's and grandfather's identification tags in his cargo pockets of his trousers. Howard's great uncle

fought and died on the

island of Okinawa during World War II.

"Finally, as I finished writing this letter, I knew he clearly joined the Marine Corps to give back to a nation that had given him so much. That's why I joined," Ellison said.

While many Marines shared the memories of Howard, one Marine knew him better than others. Lance Cpl. Dennis M. Morales, an infantryman with 1st Battalion, 2nd Marine Regiment, flew from Combat Outpost Cafaretta in Now Zad, Afghanistan to attend this memorial service. He had lost his childhood friend.

Morales and Howard grew up in the same Williamsport neighborhood, and both were 2007 graduates of Williamsport Area High School.

"He showed this California kid the true greatness of Pennsylvania," said Morales, who moved to Williamsport from Ventura, CA, during his sophomore year.

Morales joined the Corps and Howard soon followed. Morales took leave to attend Howard's boot camp graduation, and picked him up once Howard graduated from Marine Combat Training in North Carolina.

They kept in touch constantly through the years, through text messages, phone calls and Facebook. While both Marines were deployed, both Morales' and Howard's parents would send both Marines care packages. Morales also remembered that this past June marked Howard's 21st birthday.

Through his communication with Howard, Morales knew that Howard wanted to make the Marine Corps a career. "This kid would never stop talking about reenlisting. His truck had all kinds of Marine Corps stickers on them."

Although a somber moment for the Marines in Marjah, Ellison urged his Marines not to let Howard's passing divert them from their mission. "There are more patrols to be conducted, more Marjah police to be mentored, and more Marjah citizens to be helped," Ellison said.

From Rev. Kirby's Homily

When LCpl. Abram Howard paid what President Lincoln called, "the last full measure of devotion" he became, after the example of Our Lord, that grain of wheat that died to produce fruit. Within the hearts of those in his unit who benefited from his service – in the hearts of his family and friends and all who only came to *know his name in these last few days – his death* produced fruit. We will all come to cherish and appreciate the freedoms we enjoy a little more because we have learned all too painfully the 'freedom isn't free.' We will all come to express the love we hold in our hearts for those who are close to us, because we know that our time may be short. We will come to see the wisdom of the Cross a little more clearly because of Abram's life and death.

Know Before You Vote

IDENTIFICATION: If you are a newly registered voter or voting in an election district for the first time, you must show an approved form of photo or non-photo ID. For a complete list of approved ID call Toll Free 877-327-2267 or Voter Services 327-2267.

EMERGENCY BALLOTS: Can be issued under some circumstances (of course, you need to be registered).

- 1.) If you are 65 years of age or older and disabled, you may be eligible to vote by Alternative ballot if you are assigned to an inaccessible polling place.
- 2.) If an emergency arises after the deadline for absentee ballots, you have until 8:00 PM on Election Day to apply for an Emergency Ballot at the county Board of Elections. If illness is the reason, application will need physician's signature. If absence from municipality is the reason, application will need to be notarized.

Jackson Elementary School

Welcome New School Principal

Jackson Elementary School has a long tradition of close community ties, professional staff, a beautiful facility and grounds and a diverse student body. These are the some of the reasons Mr. John Killian wanted to be the principal at Jackson Elementary School. Following the recent retirement of Mrs. Kathy Eshleman, John Killian was selected as the new principal.

Mr. Killian told Inside Newberry, "Mrs. Eshelman shared with me a toy treasure chest that represented the school building. In this plastic chest, she placed toys that symbolized many of the situations and opportunities that I would find as principal of the school. As the weeks of school roll out, I am finding this school is a true treasure in itself. From the office secretaries, custodial staff, the P.T.O and the entire faculty,

everyone has been sincerely welcoming to me."

Mr. Killian plans to continue to maintain the strong relationship Jackson Elementary has with the surrounding community. The P.T.O. provides an incredible support system to the school with assisting office staff, teachers, students and parents. Mr. Killian reminds families to join the P.T.O. and stay involved with the school. "This shows the children that adult family members value education," he commented.

His vision for Jackson Elementary is to celebrate differences in cultures and learning styles yet come together with the priority on learning. A new initiative in the Williamsport Area School District (WASD) and Jackson Elementary School will be School-wide Positive Behavior. Consistent behavior expectations are shared by staff and student body using a common language. Expected behavior is taught through brief lessons. All students viewed a DVD demonstrating the behaviors in several different settings. Principal Killian, along with Mr. Rathjen, Asst. Principal, met with all students the first week of school to explain the expected behaviors. The teachers will reinforce with brief lessons in the classroom throughout the school year.

Posters hang in areas of the school as reminders to teachers and students of the expectations in that setting. Be Safe, Be Present, Be Responsible, Be Respectful is the mantra for Jackson and throughout the school district. Students will be recognized in many exciting ways for making good choices over the course of the school year.

Mr. Killian has worked in the WASD for eight years. He began as a 4th grade teacher at Stevens Elementary School then served as its Asst. Principal. The last three years, Mr. Killian was Asst. Principal at Lycoming Valley Middle School. Mr. Killian commented, "I've had the opportunity to work closely with very strong instructional leaders in this district and have had experience across many grade levels and developmental stages of children. I am familiar with the rigor of the curriculum as it spans from elementary to middle school and am excited about this new challenge."

Prior to working in the WASD, Mr. Killian taught in several Lycoming County school districts in various grade levels. He holds a Bachelor's degree in Business Administration, an Elementary Teaching Certificate, a Master's in Elementary Education and a Principals Certificate. Over the summer, Mr. Killian attended a weeklong workshop in Boston, MA for School Leaders in Literacy. "Our students need to understand that learning is on-going for your entire life. We must instill that into our children."



NEWBERRY NEW GARMENT AGENCY

A Brief History

Following a mine disaster in Wales in 1882,
Lady Diana Wolverton, founder of an orphanage in Dorsetshire, England, gathered a group of people together to make clothing (one to wear, one to wash) for the children whose parents had died in the disaster. She "glimpsed the fact that old garments might pauperize, but new garments equalize." Founded as Queen Mary's Clothing Guild (QMCG), it is still active and assisting thousands of people in need each year.

The Clothing Guild comes to America

The Needlework Guild of America was founded in Philadelphia in 1885 and incorporated in 1896 by Mrs. Harpence, who was impressed with the work that was being done by the QMCG and shared the concept with her niece, Laura Safford, who in turn told 6 of her friends. They agreed to help her sew for the needy. The first year, they collected 921 articles which were donated to hospitals and orphanages. The official name was changed to New Garment Agency, Inc. (NGA) in 1989 to better reflect the scope of services offered.

The Newberry Branch of the NGA was founded in 1914. "Our purpose is to provide new clothes, coats, shoes, linens and hygiene products to children and adults in need in the Williamsport area," said member Marcie Klinger.

She added, "The NGA's ties to Newberry are strong. Our unofficial host is St. John's Newberry UM Church where our largest annual distribution, called In-Gathering, occurs on the Monday after Thanksgiving. Although the majority of requests are filled during the In- Gathering the NGA continues to respond to needs throughout the year. In 2009, Newberry NGA served 575 individuals and countless others through member agencies such as Head Start. More than 3,300 articles of new clothing were donated for use to their clients."

This year the Newberry Branch is working with the Williamsport School District, Lycoming County Mental


Health/Mental Retardation, Children & Youth, Lycoming-Clinton County Head Start, Salvation Army and United Churches of Lycoming County/Shepherd of the Streets. All monies collected are returned to the community.

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REMEMBERING JACKSON SCHOOL

Three Generations

Told by Betsy Ross McCoy

In the July edition of Inside Newberry, you read about my mother's recollections of Jackson school in 1935. Since then, three additional generations of her children, grandchildren, and great-grandchildren have attended Jackson School – 31 at last count.

Following are brief remembrances of the school from my son, Andrew James Ross, my nephew, Jordan Andrew Artley and myself.

I attended school at the present location at Wayne and Hillside Avenues. The building had three floors, and a large playground at the rear of the school. There was only one television set, located in the auditorium/gymnasium. Girls were not allowed to wear slacks or shorts - dresses had to be fingertip-length or longer. The most advanced piece of equipment in the school was a mimeograph. I can still remember the aroma of the ink.

Many of my classmates were children of my mother's classmates. The accompanying photo is from my third grade class. Our teacher was Mrs. Connolly.

My son, Andrew, attended school in the same building. There were a few changes, the playground equipment had been removed and there were televisions in all the classrooms.

A few teachers had computers (which would not even be recognizable now!), and car phones, which were carried in large messenger-style bags over the shoulder.

A "Gifted Program" had been added to the curriculum that challenged the minds of the students enrolled. Andrew has no children attending Jackson yet, but I have high hopes.

My nephew, Jordan, started Jackson School in 2007 at the present building erected in 1993. Again, there have been many changes since Andrew graduated.

The school now has a security system. No one can enter the building unless they ring the front bell and are buzzed in by the office staff. Classrooms have computers – as do most of the students.

And more students than not also have cell phones that are slim enough to slip in a back pants pocket – a far cry from the portable phones of my day! Mimeographs have been banished to the landfills, and my guess is that not one student in Jordan's class has ever tasted Johnny Marzetti.

From our four generations, 32 children have attended Jackson School, and there will soon be even more. We have had PTA officers, grade parents, grade grandparents, and many proud parents of terrific students. And we are all honored to claim Jackson School as our elementary alma mater.


Local Establishment Adds Historical Pictures
