One of the unique aspects of our Newberry neighborhood is the number of family owned and operated businesses that flourish here. *MAS Printing* has been a West End presence for over three decades. What began as a hobby, doing projects for family and friends in high school printing shop, became a passion and vocation for Michael Anthony Salvatori. (*MAS Printing*)

Certain of his career path Mike enrolled and graduated from Williamsport Area Community College, now known as Pennsylvania College of Technology.

After graduation Mike worked for two large printing departments in the region and came to the realization that he would prefer to be his own boss. Mike purchased a used printing press and set up shop in the rear of Candelori's Market that was located on the corner of Funston and Federal Avenue. He soon outgrew that space and moved his business to a rented garage. In 1982 he purchased a storage unit at 116 Emery Street that he expanded to a 24' x 80' shop, the current

location of *MAS Printing*.

Mike's wife Camille came on board full time in the early 90's. She handles all the logistics of every order and works closely with customers. "We bend over backwards to give customers what they need when they need it," she said.

MAS Printing's talented design artist creates unique logos, letterheads, business cards, labels, newsletters, postcards, invitations or placemats to convey your message. MAS also provides



Awareness month. At the WECCC we provide food and clothing for all who are in need, many of whom are just one emergency away from being homeless.




Please consider sponsoring a Boy Scout or come in and ask Todd for more details.



Last spring, the students at West Branch School

had the opportunity to plant a garden behind the school, which provided many authentic, hands-on learning experiences. To decide what to plant, students first learned about this area's planting zone and which particular vegetables would successfully grow in Williamsport, PA. Then, they brainstormed a list of vegetables they wanted to grow in the garden. In late spring, the students planted kale, Swiss chard, and lettuce by seed. The gardening preparation and planting was mainly done by the school's upstairs students (grades 3-6), although the younger students did have a chance to plant some seeds. Over the summer, current teacher Colleen Winton and retired teacher Steve Hulslander planted tomatoes, squash, cucumbers, peppers, broccoli, and cauliflower. Colleen and Steve continued to care for the garden over the summer months when school was not in session. Now that a new school year has begun, the students will continue to harvest and enjoy the vegetables.

Through the use of the school's garden, healthy eating is emphasized as students are able to sample fresh, hand-picked vegetables. Before school ended last June. some kale had grown and was ready to be harvested. It was not uncommon to see students walking around the playground snacking on kale. The upstairs

students also harvested some of the kale, made a kale salad with homemade dressing, and ate the salad "family style" sitting around the tables in one of the school's two full-sized kitchens. Since returning to school, students have picked tomatoes, peppers, and kale to take home to their families.

Anyone who has ever grown vegetables realizes that planting and maintaining a garden requires patience, responsibility, and hard work. Through working in the school's garden, the students have had real-life opportunities to develop these character qualities, as well as a sense of community and a true appreciation for all the steps involved in growing healthy, fresh, and nutritious food. ## **HISTORY OF NEWBERRY LITTLE LEAGUE - PART II**

This year's Little League World Series brought a lot of national, regional and local pride to a lot of our loval readers. The local Keystone Little League fought hard in the Regional round against the eventual winner, Endwell, New York. Our hats are off to those young men who brought home the win.

But what of the local scene? When was the last time a local team has been in the mix for a world championship? A great many of us were not even born when the last local team won (Maynard Little League), and a lot of us were not born when our Newberry All Stars represented Pennsylvania and the Eastern **Region in a World Series!** 

Let us go back to the beginning. At the outset a league was founded for a group of boys from the local Lincoln School. They were originally refused admittance to the Original Little League because they were outside the boundaries set by Original. A group of men formed the league for boys who attended Lincoln School. Some of these men include; Ralph Cupp, Dewey Knecht, Lewis Eckstein, Vic Derr, Bill Shooter, Raymond Krezmer, and B.C.Hunsinger. A few of these men went to Mr. Daley, President of Sweet Steel and

acquired an old cornfield on Arch Street to make a field.

All of the above men put in the hard work with the help of Father John Piontek from the Holy Rosary Church, to build the field. Allison Construction donated a dozer and a man to help! Eventually the Schultz Family donated the land that Newberry Little League now calls home. We have grown from one field and a press box to four fields, an awesome concession, and two press boxes; one for the girls and one for the boys. We have several practice fields and batting cages for our players. And in addition, because of our rich history we have a monument park honoring those that have volunteered more than they had to.

After our appearance in the 1947 National Little League Series, later changed to the Little League World Series, it would be two decades before our League would ascend the heights of stardom and appear again. To be continued... Look for the rest of this story in the next issue of insideNewberry.




## 50th Anniversary Car Raffle and Progressive Dinner

## Don't Wait – Check the Date!

Why do we spend so much time focusing on smoke alarms? Simple. Time and time again we have seen misconceptions about smoke alarms, many of which can put you at serious risk in the event of a fire in your home. This fall's fire safety message addresses smoke alarm replacement with a few key messages:

- Smoke alarms should be replaced every ten years
- Make sure you know how old your smoke alarms are
- Remove your smoke alarm and look at the manufacture date on the back of the alarm, if it's more than ten years ago, replace it!

Don't forget your basic smoke alarm procedures also!

- Test smoke alarms monthly by pressing the test button
- Change your batteries at least once a year
- Install alarms in every bedroom, outside every sleeping area, and on every level of your home including the basement
- For the best protection, install interconnected alarms. When one sounds, they all sound.

Always remember, smoke alarms are your first line of defense and greatly increase you and your family's chance of survival in the event of a fire.

## Polls are open on Election Day continuously from 7:00 AM until 8:00 PM

We anticipate extremely high turnout in this election, and there may be lines to vote during peak periods. Voters who are in line to vote when the polls close at 8:00 pm are legally entitled to vote as long as they stay in line.

FEDERAL OFFICES ON THE BALLOT: President of the United States United States Senator 10th District Congressional Representatives

STATE OFFICES ON THE BALLOT: Attorney General Auditor General State Treasurer 23rd District General Assembly Senator 83rd & 84th District General Assembly Representatives

In addition to the above offices, one statewide referendum will appear on the ballot. The referendum, if approved, would amend the text of the state constitution to raise the mandatory retirement age for judges from 70 to 75. The state Legislature ordered this question removed from the April 26 primary ballot too late in the process for counties to change their ballots, so although the question appeared on the primary ballot the results did not count. The question will now appear on the November ballot instead.

**Tuesday, October 11** – The last day to register to vote or make changes to your registration before the election.

**Tuesday, November 1 at 5 PM** is the deadline to apply for a civilian absentee ballot. Applications must be received in the Office of Voter Services before the deadline in order to be processed. Faxed or emailed applications cannot be accepted. **Postmarks do not count**. When submitting an application by mail, allow 2 days minimum for delivery of in-county mail and 3-5 days for out-of-county mail.

**Friday, November 4 at 5 PM** is the deadline to return a voted civilian absentee ballot. Voted absentee ballots must be received in the Office of Voter Services before the deadline in order for the ballot to be fully counted. **Postmarks do not count**. In a presidential year, votes for PRESIDENT only shall be counted on absentee ballots received after Friday at 5:00 PM and before the close of polls on Election Day. When submitting a voted absentee ballot by mail, allow 2 days minimum for delivery of in-county mail and 3-5 days for out-of-county mail. Due to the weight and thickness of absentee balloting materials, additional postage may be required.

**Civilians who experience an emergency after 5:00pm on Tuesday, November 1 may be eligible to apply for an emergency civilian absentee ballot**. Contact the Office of Voter Services for more information.

Uniformed military and their dependents and overseas civilians apply for and submit absentee ballots in accordance with different requirements and deadlines. Contact the Office of Voter Services for more information.

If you are uncertain of where to vote on Election Day, contact the Office of Voter Services.



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

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# **NEWBERRY ESTATES NEWS**

## Finding a Family at Newberry Estates

This July I accepted a temporary position with Newberry Estates. On my first day I entered the building expecting to help with filing and answering the phones. I was not expecting the wonderful family atmosphere. Immediately I felt comfortable and accepted, and I saw that everyone that walked through the doors felt the same.

And there always seems to be an event going on to keep it that way: a community cook-out, a summer lunch program, and a 5 day Bible Club. Even without the special events, the staff and community members make this little corner of Newberry feel like home.
