# What Are the Odds?

### NEWBERRY GOLFER ACCOMPLISHES AMAZING FEAT

"I don't know what the odds are, but it's very unusual." said John Borowski, as we marveled at what had recently happened. While at the Wynding Brook Golf Course, John hit a hole-in-one on the 9th hole, a par-three, 97-yard uphill challenge. That was on June 29th. He was playing in a foursome with Bernie Borowski, Cliff Bower and Joe Hiller. Then on September 4th, John was in a foursome with Chris Barnett,

Tom Fink and Steve Montgomery, the very next time playing at Wynding Brook, and he did it again. Same course, same hole. That two-tiered, blind shot, hole number 9. A hole-in-one on the same hole, two times in a row.

"That green has a hill in the back, so if your ball doesn't roll back down, you know you made a good shot." John told me. "The first time, I felt good about it, and it went in. The second time, I notice the pin placement was a little to the right from where it was before. I made the adjustment, and took a nice, easy swing." Joe Hiller and Mike Duck were in the group just ahead of John. As Joe was with him the first time he aced the ninth, he and Mike stopped to watch the next attempt. Up the hill came the ball, past the hole, down the hill, and into the cup. Joe and Mike started to cheer. "I thought they were just messing with me," John says, "But when the ball didn't come back down the hill, I figured it went in again, and it did!"

John's had a total of three holes-in-one. The first was at Myrtle Beach National in South Carolina years ago. The next two were on the same hole just nine weeks apart this summer. When you love to golf, a hole-in-one is a dream come true. John's accomplishment goes a little beyond that. So what will his approach be the next time he plays the ninth hole at Wynding Brook? "Gonna take a nice, easy swing. I'm going right for it." he says.

So what are the odds? Well, according to Golf Digest, the odds of an amateur golfer making a hole-in-one is 12,500-to-one. The odds of two amateur golfers in a foursome making a hole-in-one on the same hole are 26-million-to-one. The math isn't in yet on what John Borowski has done, but from the information I was able to gather, the odds of his feat are somewhere between 17-million to one and 25-million to one. In any case, John's got a good story to tell for a long time to come. ~ *Bob Woodley*

Our November and December fundraisers will be "Cardboard Camping for the WECCC", Christmas candy and a Christmas Wreath sale. Will have more on these



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

- Water, one gallon of water per person per day, for drinking and sanitation
- At least a three-day supply of non-perishable food
- Battery-powered radio and a NOAA Weather Radio with tone alert and extra batteries for both
- Flashlight and extra batteries
- First Aid kit
- Whistle to signal for help
- Infant formula and diapers, if you have an infant
- Moist towelettes, garbage bags and plastic ties for personal sanitation
- · Dust mask or cotton t-shirt, to help filter the air
- Plastic sheeting and duct tape to shelter-in-place
- Wrench or pliers to turn off utilities
- Can opener for food (if kit contains canned food)
- Rain Gear
- Cold and Warm weather clothing
- Medicine



# **Democracy In Action**

THE 2017 FORM OF GOVERNMENT BALLOT QUESTION AND WHAT IT MEANS FOR YOU AND FOR WILLIAMSPORT

"Shall a charter commission of seven members be elected to study the charter and form of government of the city of Williamsport and to consider a new charter and to make recommendations thereon?"

There's been a lot of coverage and commentary lately about two questions that will appear this November on the ballot in Williamsport. To help clarify the meaning of the important and timely inclusion of the above question on Williamsport's 2017 ballot, here's a brief explanation.

The Form of Government ballot question asks Williamsport voters their opinion about electing a commission to examine the three different forms of government available to the city as options under Third

Class City Code. The question will be followed by a list of individuals running for the Form of Government commission – a short-term commission elected to make a recommendation to the voters on which form would be best for Williamsport. The seven individuals who receive the most votes will be elected to the Form of Government commission only if the above ballot question also gets a "yes" vote from the voters.

A "yes" vote on this question by the voters of the city will appoint the commission, which then has a 9-month period to study the three forms of government (commission, strong mayor, and council-manager) and recommend one form - either a change to a new form, or remaining with the same form – for the city moving forward. That recommendation will then be publicized. explained and, finally, will appear as a question on the

November 2018 ballot, where Williamsport voters can decide whether they wish to accept the recommendation with another "yes" vote or reject it by voting "no." Only then, after 9 months of study by an elected commission and two different voter referendums, could Williamsport change the way city government operates, if the voters choose to.

This ballot question, which last appeared on the ballot in the 1970's, when Williamsport switched from the "commission" form to the "strong mayor" form of government, opens up many possibilities for better management and governance in the city, without radically altering how our government does business. A "yes" vote this November can allow us to build a stronger democracy within our city by examining how our government operates and if it can be improved.

# The Home Rule Charter Question

### GIVING US A GREATER VOICE IN OUR OWN GOVERNMENT

Imagine living in a city where citizens really believe they have a voice in their own government, where voters help create a form of government that represents everyone. That process can begin if this ballot question passes in November:

"Shall a government study commission of seven members be elected to study the existing form of government of the municipality, to consider the advisability of the adoption of a home rule charter and, if advisable, to draft and to recommend a home rule charter?"

### What is home rule?

Home rule permits a municipality to tailor its structure and operations to fit its own specific needs.. With home rule, Williamsport would set its own rules and no longer be subject to the third-class city code, as long as the city remains in compliance with state laws.

To date, 22 of the 53 third-class cities in Pennsylvania have adopted home rule charters, including five in the last ten years: Altoona, Easton, Nanticoke, Pittston, and Sharon. Some home rule cities have strong mayors, some give more power to council, and some have a city manager. But whatever system they adopt, no home rule city has ever considered returning to third-class city status.

### What are the advantages?

- Greater flexibility
- Greater efficiency

- More representative government
- · More citizen engagement

### What changes could be up for discussion?

- Term limits for mayor and/or council
- · Some council members elected at large, some elected by district
- · Council of six members plus a mayor as "first among
- A professional city manager who handles day-to-day city business
- Treasurer and controller appointed rather than elected
- Citizen initiative, referendum, and recall tools that give voters more direct control over their own government

### What will home rule cost?

Short term: Very little. Temporary commissioners serve, without pay, only until voters vote on the home rule charter at the next election.

Long term: Potential for savings by eliminating some elected positions, ending duplication and reducing the high cost of benefits.

#### The end result

With home rule, voters decide how much representation and control they want over City Hall. When citizens are more engaged, government becomes more effective and more responsive to all constituents.





While daily life went on for working families and lumber barons in Victorian Williamsport, a secret effort carried out mostly at night was helping persons escape from slavery in the south to freedom in the north. Some who reached our community stayed, others went on to New York and Canada, especially after the Fugitive Slave Act was passed nationally in 1850. The effort to help runaways in the clandestine actions that we call The Underground Railroad was carried out by people of different races, religions, and walks of life – united in their efforts to overcome a great wrong, slavery, and to help people escape it.


