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Improvements to Phil Park in Flux

Ever since the public park in Newberry was named for Mayor Phil Preziosi, he's been working to make the park more usable and accessible. His efforts have been met with praise and enthusiasm as well as criticism and obstruction. So far, the critics and obstructionists are having their way. Originally, as you may have read in this publication, there was a plan to install a stage that could be removed and stored when not in use. As the original plan met with some opposition from Newberry residents who live closest to the park, a compromise was put forth. And then another. Eventually, the city decided to install a concrete pad that could be used for a variety of purposes, and wouldn't change the aesthetic of the park. So when city workers showed up to get to work, Phil Preziosi tells me, they were accosted by the same nearby residents who want nothing at the park to change. What they said to the workers hasn't been revealed, but it was enough to get the city employees to abandon the work site and leave the project in limbo. While the improvements at Phil park are welcome by a majority of Newberry residents, it seems the minority is holding sway over the majority. The alarming part is, they seem to be doing it with the help of the City Council.

I have been told by two sources that a meeting was held at a Newberry residence about the planned improvements to Phil Park. It's alleged that Sunshine Laws were broken because a quorum of City Council members were there to discuss city business without the public being notified. No City Council members have confirmed that such a meeting has taken place. It is also alleged that a few of the residents who live by the park have used whatever influence they have to convince enough City Council members to support their obstruction of changes to Phil Park. It is this support from City Council that perhaps led to the capitulation of the city workers when

confronted by a few residents when attempting to begin work on the park. In any case, the stage project is on hold. There is, however, another plan moving forward. Phil is working to add playground equipment to the park. Not just any playground equipment, but playground equipment that is accessible to physically challenged children. Phil says there are at least two group homes in the area that help these children, so he hopes that adding accessible fun will help make the park more useful to more Newberry residents.

Phil says he won't be here forever, and neither will the residents who are opposed to the changes. "I just want to leave something good behind for the future. Young people need community events to learn how to socialize and promote brotherhood." ~ Bob Woodley

Timothy Montgomery Memorial Scholarship Fund Established at WASD Education Foundation

The Tim Montgomery Memorial Scholarship Fund was established by his family to memorialize the health and physical education teacher who taught at WAHS and coached the Millionaire football team for more than 25 years.

He passed away at the age of 74 on August 15 after a long battle with cancer.

Montgomery came to WAHS in 1977 from Shamokin. It was a move that laid the foundation for a storied career and one that earned him a spot in the Pennsylvania Scholastic Football Coaches Association Hall of Fame in 2003 as the winningest coach in WAHS's 120-year history. His coaching career at WAHS amassed a record of 165 wins, 93 losses and 3 ties. He retired in 2001.

Born in Kane, PA, he graduated from and played football for Penn State. As a Nittany Lion, he was two-time Letterman, garnered AP Second Team All-American Honors as a star safety, and played in both the Gator Bowl and Senior Bowl.

After graduating from PSU, Montgomery taught and played semi-professional football in Richmond, VA. His coaching career began as an assistant coach in Altoona alongside Earl Strohm. He later accepted his first head coach position in Shamokin, where his team won the Eastern Conference Championship in 1975. "As a dedicated (teacher) and head football coach, he exemplified the hard work, discipline and honor he taught to his students and athletes," his family stated. "His dry sense of humor and caring for young men and women impacted generations. Coach Montgomery's family, friends, students and players would like to establish this scholarship in his memory to carry on his legacy."

Future recipients of the scholarship must be a "football player of outstanding character who plans to continue his education and who displays qualities

that Coach Montgomery valued. The recipient should demonstrate integrity and hard work, both in the classroom and on the field."




Newberry/Jaysburg Christmas Tree Lighting

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

Neither the NCP nor insideNewberry endorses any political party or candidate

Statewide judicial offices, local judicial offices, and county, city, borough, township, and School Director offices will appear on the November ballot. In addition, one proposed amendment to the state constitution and six judicial retention questions will appear on the ballot in all 85 precincts in Lycoming County.

The statewide judicial office that will appear on the ballot is Judge of the Superior Court (2 seats).

The local judicial offices that will appear on the ballot are Judge of the Court of Common Pleas (1 seat) and Magisterial District Judge (29-1-02).

The county offices that will appear on the ballot are County Commissioner (vote for two, electing three); Controller; Coroner; District Attorney; Prothonotary; Register and Recorder; and County Treasurer.

The city offices that will appear on the ballot are Mayor; City Treasurer; City Controller; and City Council (4 seats).

In Williamsport Area School District, four School Directors are to be elected to 4-year terms; and one School Director is to be elected to a 2-year term.

In addition to the above contests, a proposed amendment to the state constitution will appear on the ballot in all 85 precincts in the county:

Proposed Amendment to the Constitution of Pennsylvania Crime Victim Rights

Shall the Pennsylvania Constitution be amended to grant certain rights to crime victims, including to be treated with fairness, respect and dignity; considering their safety in bail proceedings; timely notice and opportunity to take part in public proceedings; reasonable protection from the accused; right to refuse discovery requests made by the accused; restitution and return of property; proceedings free from delay; and to be informed of these rights, so they can enforce them?

Finally, six judicial retention questions will appear on the ballot in all 85 precincts in the county:

Question 1. Shall Anne E. Lazarus be retained for an additional term as Judge of the Superior Court of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania?

Question 2. Shall Judy Olson be retained for an additional term as Judge of the Superior Court of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania?

Question 3. Shall Kevin Brobson be retained for an additional term as Judge of the Commonwealth Court of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania?

Question 4. Shall Patricia A. McCullough be retained for

Friday, November 1 is the last day to return a voted civilian absentee ballot. Voted absentee ballots must be received in the Office of Voter Services before 5:00pm in order for the ballot to be counted. **Postmarks do not count**. When submitting a voted absentee ballot by mail, allow at least 2 days for delivery of local mail. Due to the weight and thickness of absentee ballot cardstock, additional postage may be required.
