Gabriel Ends Tenure Coordinating Sponsors, Passes Baton

Look around the pages of insideNewberry, and you will see what look like ads, but are more like expressions of community support. Look around to find the individual responsible for marshaling that support, and the figure is hidden in the background. That hidden figure, Alannah Gabriel, is hanging up her pavement-pounding shoe leather after more than 15 years organizing the sponsorships for insideNewberry.

As a community, Newberry has a

lot of heroes – teachers, medical personnel, firefighters, police – but we also want to celebrate the volunteers like her who have helped Newberry find its voice. Along the way, we want to celebrate the sponsors, too, who make this community publication possible.

Gabriel got in on the ground floor when insideNewberry and the Newberry Community Partnership were first starting, and she was the one who first walked the circuit of Newberry stores to cast a vision for a community publication sponsored by community businesses. The difference between a sponsorship and an advertisement, she points out, is that sponsors join up not merely to advertise their services but also because they care about the community. Gabriel says that she has been amazed at how generous the Newberry business community has always been, and how supportive of community endeavors.

"I've been looking back, taking a trip down memory lane to when we first started [insideNewberry]," Gabriel says, "and I'm getting a little teary-eyed. I mean, we have done some pretty cool stuff!"

As an endeavor of the 501(c)3 NCP, insideNewberry does not make a profit on the sponsoring ads, keeping its rates where they need to be just to pay the printing bill. The publication itself has articles written by volunteers in the community, and it is distributed for free at different public locations and businesses in the area. Trees on the Distant Horizon

CITY COUNCIL TACKLES CHALLENGES FACING NEWBERRY

The residents of Newberry aren't the only ones still upset about PennDOT's removal of trees from West Fourth Street.

It's been over two years now since Williamsport City Council members, including Liz Miele and Dave Banks, have been negotiating with the state to get the trees, which were removed in February 2019, replaced.

"It should be a part of PennDOT's plan to not only replace the previous trees but augment the number of trees, because street trees are an asset both to the city and to the individual homeowner," Miele, vice-president of city council, recently said. "Dave [Banks] put together a list of all the reasons why street trees on Fourth Street are desirable, including slowing down the speed of traffic."

Banks offered more reasons from that list. "They're a noise and dust barrier from the road. They provide shade, reducing indoor heat in the summertime. They provide a wind barrier to reduce heat wicking in the wintertime. Street trees increase property values," he said.

PennDOT had the legal right to remove the trees for the repaving project, but local ordinances require them to replace the trees, said the city officials, who reported repeatedly meeting with state officials about this issue.

"At the end of every meeting, we have the impression from conversation in the room that they plan to put the trees back. And then they send us the minutes, and the minutes make it seem as though we had another conversation entirely, and state that they aren't replacing the trees," said Miele.

PennDOT officials have indicated some willingness to replace the trees, but their current proposal puts this off for at least another five years. "It keeps getting pushed back, for budgetary reasons," said Miele.

The local company that was contracted to remove the trees has offered to donate new trees to be planted either along the street when it's reconstructed or in the yards of the residents who lost trees. It's an excellent gesture, but not a full solution, the officials noted. They believe the responsibility for replacing street trees lies with the government agency that ordered them removed – and they believe those new trees should continue to line Fourth St., whether or not residents also plant trees in their yards.

"Street trees are really a desirable feature," Banks said. "We'll make sure the trees get replaced."

The councillors have also been working on long-term changes to address other issues of recent concern to Newberry residents, including potential retail developments like Dollar General. A few months ago, city officials, regardless of their feelings on the issue, were legally obligated to approve a Dollar General project on Washington Boulevard that was heavily criticized by area residents.

Since then, Councilman Banks spearheaded a successful effort to implement changes to the code to require future development to be more in keeping with the existing neighborhood.

"We made changes to require pedestrian entrances from the street," said Banks, who is

chair of the council's Economic Revitalization Committee. Other code changes affected the required setbacks from the street and were designed to encourage pedestrian-friendly, small business development.

Banks noted there are other zoning changes under discussion that could also help the citizens

of Newberry, including allowing grocery stores and restaurants with drive-throughs on Reach Road. "Newberry is the closest thing Williamsport has to a food desert," said Banks. "It would be good to get a grocery store nearby and places for the people who work on Reach Road to go to lunch." ~ Submitted by Stacey Butterfield





Neither the NCP nor insideNewberry endorses any political party or candidate

All 81 precincts will be open for in-person voting on Election Day from 7:00 am until 8:00 pm. Judicial, county, School Director, city, borough, township, Constable, and poll worker offices will appear on the Democratic and Republican primary ballots.

In addition to the primary ballot, three proposed amendments to the state constitution will be voted on at all 81 precincts in Lycoming County.

- Article III, Section 9 Relating to Termination or Extension of Disaster Emergency Declarations
- 2) Article IV Disaster Emergency Declaration and Management
- Article I Prohibition Against Denial or Abridgement of Rights Because of Race or Ethnicity

All registered voters in Lycoming County will be eligible to cast a ballot on May 18 regardless of their party affiliation on their voter registration record.

Voters registered with Democratic or Republican parties are eligible to vote on their respective party primary ballots to select party nominees to appear on the November ballot. They are also eligible to vote on the proposed constitutional amendments.

Voters registered with all other political parties (Green, Independent, Libertarian, etc.) are eligible to vote only on the proposed constitutional amendments.

The complete text of the proposed constitutional amendments and accompanying Plain English Statements are posted on the Voter Services website at www.lyco.org/vote.


Monday, April 19 – sample ballots for all precincts available upon request at the Office of Voter Services or at our website, **www.lyco.org/vote.**

Monday, May 3 – last day to register to vote or make changes to your registration before election.

Tuesday, May 11 is the last day to apply to vote by mail. Applications must be received by Voter Services before 5:00pm. Faxed or emailed applications cannot be accepted. Postmarks do not count. Voters who will be out of their municipality for work or school or have an illness or disability must apply for an absentee ballot. Voters who are not eligible for an absentee ballot but still wish to vote by mail must apply for a mail-in ballot.

A voter receiving an absentee ballot or mail-in ballot and appears at a polling place to vote in person on Election Day may only vote by provisional ballot, unless voter surrenders official ballot and official ballot return envelope to Judge of Elections at polling place to be spoiled in order to vote a regular ballot.







