Join Neighbors to Pick Up Litter April 22

"The grass is greener on the other side of the fence." We all are familiar with this common idiom. For me, the dream of living in an area where litter is non-existent can be a reality. The antidote to this ancient proverb is to foster gratitude for what we DO have and to work for the changes we want to see here in Newberry. So, how do we work towards litter free neighborhoods? Participate in the annual Newberry Community Partnership's Spring litter cleanup!



This year's event coincides with the international celebration of Earth Day. Founded in 1970, the April 22 Earth Day is designated worldwide as an environmental action day. This year it happens to be on a Saturday, thus conveniently the day of our cleanup.

Volunteers are URGENTLY needed to meet at 9:30 a.m. at the West End Christian Community Center, 901 Diamond Street. At that time, participants will be given safety vests, gloves, bags (both for trash and recyclables), and instructions. We will have maps there, and you can pick a route to walk and clean up.

Children are welcome with an adult. Adults are welcome with or without children. Scout troops, families, sports teams, faith groups, and other organizations are all welcome. The cleanup is registered with the Keep Pennsylvania Beautiful program, and the Susquehanna Greenway Earth Week Cleanup is including our event in their publicity. What's more, the City of Williamsport's Recreation Department is actively coordinating the efforts of Lycoming College, Penn College, and the Newberry Community Partnership, all of whom are holding cleanups that day, thus fostering a city-wide campaign.

Habitat Home Repair Program Open for Newberry Applicants

Spring is the time for HOME REPAIRS! Greater Lycoming Habitat for Humanity (Habitat) has announced they are continuing their Home Preservation (Repair) Program, and their target area includes Newberry. Habitat is well known for building affordable, efficient housing for lower income home ownership, but, as Executive Director Duane Hershberger explained, Habitat recognizes that lower income people who already own their homes often need some help too.

This Home Preservation program provides repair help for homes owned and occupied by lower income households. All sorts of minor exterior home repairs are eligible. Typical projects include accessibility modifications (ramps, handrails, etc.), fence repair, porches, deck and stair work, and yard clean-up. These repairs and modifications not only make homes safer and more accessible for their residents but they also maintain or improve the property value of the home.

This is not an emergency repair program, so consider what repairs your home may need in the near



future – before they become emergencies. There is a waiting list. However, if your repair project qualifies, the sooner you apply, the sooner you may get help for your home.

Applicants should be aware that they must be the owner-occupant of the home, meet household income limits, and be currently paid up on property taxes and home insurance. There also may be some costs to participants, depending on household income. Participants may be required to repay a small percentage of the projects' material cost, such as the cost of lumber for the project.

If a participant's household income is below 30% of current guidelines, they repay nothing. If between 30% and 50%, they repay 10% of the

material cost. Households with incomes over 50% repay 25% of the material cost. Those who receive help through the program have up to two years to repay any required matching amount, and no interest is charged. The maximum project cost is \$5,000.

Local Network Hopes and Plans for Newberry Youth

A small group of concerned Newberry citizens met together in early March to share perspectives and ideas for how to help the youth of the Newberry community. After school and during breaks, Newberry young people have little to do and few resources available to them, and this informal "youth council" hopes to provide some of the guidance and resources needed.

The first meeting included Calvin Phillips of the West End Christian Community Center (WECCC), Ron Johnson of Diamond Street Christian Church, Conrad Shank of Newberry Christian Fellowship, and Joshua Hill of the Newberry Community Partnership. "At the very least, we needed to get these people together to meet one another and get in contact," said Hill, who organized the meeting. "Developing a network of shared concern is the first step."

Each member shared what had been done for youth in the past through their organization, what programs might be put together for the near future, and what kind of resources might be needed. Many of the youth activities of the past were "pre-pandemic," and the group hoped to rejuvenate some of those earlier efforts. Johnson reported that he had been part of a teens-vs-police basketball tournament at Memorial park, one that also involved food and music. The goal was to provide a fun activity but also to make a way for the youth to have a friendly connection to area police. Phillips said that the WECCC used to hold street fairs in their parking lot, and their building used to host a summer YMCA program. Johnson also described former "youth resource picnics" at Preziosi Park that featured games for kids while also connecting them with local opportunities and activities.

Also before the pandemic, Johnson spearheaded an after-school tutoring program at Newberry Estates whose volunteers always had young people there for homework help. "These kids, they just want to know if they can depend on you. They need to know that you'll be there for them," Johnson explained. Shank led a cooking class that was initially held at Newberry Christian Fellowship, but moved after that into his home. He reports that the kids involved chose a menu together, cooked the food together, and ate together. The activity provided an activity that is both social and skill-building, and the fact that it involved food didn't hurt its popularity!

The group discussed data from a survey done by Williamsport Area High School asking students what after school activities they would be interested in. Two that caught the group's attention were "culinary classes" and "exercise programs." The culinary interest confirms what Shank has seen in his own program, and Phillips had already been talking to contacts who teach culinary classes, plotting to bring them in for youth classes in the industrial kitchen at the WECCC.

Phillips was also interested in the exercise program idea. He has been working to clean out a garage space at the WECCC with the goal of putting in a free-weight gym and opening it to youth for exercise classes or gym hours. Phillips would like to connect veterans with the youth through the hands-on activity of weight lifting. Once set up, a free-weight gym could be another healthy social activity for Newberry youth.

In the future, Hill would like to see a youth community center that could be a central spot for academic help, games like pool and foosball, and guidance help for youth trying to navigate social, personal, and vocational difficulties. "Many of these guys I talk to," Johnson said, "don't believe they have a future." This group hopes to tell the youth they do have a future, but also to help get them there.

Shank's church fellowship will be holding occasional "pizza at the park" events with lawn games, as they have in previous summers, and Phillips also hopes to have a half-court basketball hoop up by the summer, possibly hosting some 2X2 tournaments. A sooner free event is the April 22 Youth Praise and Worship Night featuring 11

different youth artist groups, such as the St. John Neuman Choir and the Jesus Sound Squad. Doors open at 5 p.m. at Clarke Chapel on the Lycoming College Campus.

How to Plan Well for Death and Burial

About two out of three Americans believe planning ahead for their death and burial is important, but only one out of five actually do so, according to a study by the National Funeral Directors Association. People put off dealing with the question for many understandable reasons, not least of which is discomfort planning for their own death. However, another reason is that many people don't know what issues to consider or what options are available.

In Newberry, we have two funeral homes – Knight-Confer and Sanders – and Wildwood Cemetery close by. Professionals at these establishments can talk through some of the questions and options for end-of-life planning so that no one or their family must face the turmoil of those decisions at the last minute.


At Wildwood, we have seen how the turmoil of losing a loved one can become even more stressful to a family when the deceased's final affairs were left unsettled. The loved one may have had a preference about their final resting place, but they hadn't planned for that resting place financially or communicated their decision to all their family.

Unfortunately, many families struggle to handle these kinds of post-death processes on top of deciding on where and how their loved one will be interred, further compounding the stress and grief they experience. To alleviate that common problem, we recommend that everyone consider finding answers to the following questions when deciding on their end-of-life arrangements:

- Will my grave be easily accessible for visitors, and how many graves do I wish to purchase?
- Will my family be buried along with me or at another location later on?
- Will I want some sort of memorial placed at my grave site?
- How do I want my remains handled postdeath, such as cremation or full burial?

- With what funeral home do I want to make arrangements? What kinds of services do funeral homes and cemeteries offer?
- What sort of financial preparations do I want to make now so that my preferences can be carried out without that obstacle?
- Will I want a funeral and memorial service at the same time, or separate in time?
- To which of my family members do I need to communicate my plan, preferences, and contacts?

Many funeral directors and cemetery representatives can assist with these questions, giving you the information you need for your decisions and planning. Though death and taxes are said to be the two constants in life, death is the one that doesn't have a regular filing date each year. Some people have time to make these plans, and some do not, but everyone seems to need to deal with this issue in the end. Make sure you are ready. ~ *Fred Erikson and Caleb Hipple*

Neither the NCP nor *inside*Newberry endorses any political party or candidate

All 81 precincts will be open for in-person voting on Election Day from 7:00 am until 8:00 pm. Judicial, county, School Director, city, borough, and township offices will appear on the Democratic and Republican primary ballots. A list of all candidates who have filed to run for local offices is posted on the Voter Services website at **www. Iyco.org/vote.**

Voters who are registered with the Democratic or Republican parties are eligible to vote on their respective party primary ballots to select party nominees to appear on the November ballot.

Voters who are registered with all other political parties (Green, Independent, Libertarian, etc.) are not eligible to participate in the primary. They will be eligible to vote in the November election.

Monday, April 7 sample ballots for all precincts will be available at the Office of Voter Services and on the Voter Services website at www.lyco.org/ vote.

Monday, May 1 is the last day to register to vote or make changes to your registration before the election.

Tuesday, May 9 is the last day to apply to vote by mail. Applications must be received by Voter Services before 5:00pm. Faxed or emailed applications cannot be accepted. Postmarks do not count. Voters who will be out of their municipality for work or school or have an illness or disability must apply for an absentee ballot. Voters who are not eligible for an absentee ballot but still wish to vote by mail must apply for a mail-in ballot.

Tuesday, May 16 at 8:00 pm is the deadline for Voter Services to receive voted absentee and mail-in ballots. Ballots received after 8:00pm cannot be counted.

Polls are open Election Day continuously 7 AM until 8 PM

A voter who receives an absentee or mail-in ballot and appears at a polling place to vote in person on Election Day may only vote by provisional ballot, unless the voter surrenders the official ballot and official return envelope to the Judge of Elections at the polling place to be spoiled in order to vote a regular ballot.

Voters who experience an emergency after 5:00 pm on Tuesday, May 9 may be eligible to apply for an emergency absentee ballot. Contact Voter Services for more information.

Uniformed military and their dependents and overseas civilians apply for and submit absentee ballots in accordance with different requirements and deadlines. Contact Voter Services for more information.







